RAPID TRANSIT AGREEMENT.

The stockholders of the Rapid Transit Co. met yesterday afternoon and ratified the action of the board of directors in the matter of the negotiations for the purchase of the rights and property of the Tramways Company. There were 5314 shares out of the 10,000 represented. The agreement calls for the transfer to the Tramways Company of \$150,000 of 6 per cent bonds of the Rapid Transit Co., and at the option of the Rapid Transit Co., either \$150,000 in cash or in the stock of the corporation. After the meeting, a cablegram was sent to the office of the Tramways Co. in London announcing the result of the meeting.

Senator McCandless was in perfect accord with the resolution and dissented from the remarks of the previous speaker. The Senate was very much interested in 62 bills. It had passed 64 and 62 were in the House.

Senator Isenberg—"There is a great deal of argument, but if the House sent a resolution like that up here I would tell them in plain language to go plumb to—you can think the rest."

Senator Kaohi feared the effect would be like that from whipping a mule, and therefore moved the resolution be laid on the table.

Senator Baldwin was in sympathy with the contents of the resolution but did not know whether it would be well to pass it. At all events the discussion itself was likely to have good results.

The motion to lay on the table having been lost 5 to 7, Senator Cecil Brown renewed Senator Kalauekalan's motion to refer it to a special committee. This carried but up till recess the committee was not appointed.

Burn Treasury Certificates.
Senator Dickey presented a joint resolution that the Treasurer of the Territory be empowered to destroy the canceled silver and gold certificates at present in the Treasury in present of the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives. Adopted.

Senator McCandless introduced a bill to create a territorial department of secret service.

Ended in Smoke.
Senator Kalauekalan presented a resolution that members of the Senate be allowed to smoke for the remainder of the session from this date.

Senator Baldwin thought the Senate should preserve its dignity. At night sessions members of the Legislature had always allowed themselves to smoke. It would not do while ladies were visiting the Senate.

Senator Achi amidst laughter proposed to refer the resolution to the Committee on Miscellaneous Petitions.

Senator Dickey, chairman of that committee, showed how it would fare there by reciting the old ditty, "Tobacco is a filthy weed."

The resolution was declared lost. President Crabbe taunting the introducer with voting against it himself.

Railway Law Amendment.
Senator Baldwin gave notice of a bill to amend the law relating to railways.

Winston Railway Franchise.
The Winston railway franchise bill came up for third reading.

Senator Kalauekalan moved to refer it to a committee, as there was danger of conflict with the O. R. & L. Co.'s franchise.

Senator Dickey said the facts had been known to the committee that reported the bill, and Mr. Dillingham was understood to have had no objections to the bill as reported. Since then the speaker and other Senators had discovered that if the Winston line ran across the extension of Queen street it would trench on the terminal yard of the O. R. & L. Co.

President Crabbe from the floor, Senator Isenberg presiding, asked Senator Dickey a question, to which the reply was that the trouble to be avoided was that of collisions. The speaker went on to say that Mr. Dillingham did not think of the risk to carriages on the

SENATE.

WANT REPRESENTATIVES TO PASS SOME SENATE BILLS.

Senator Cecil Brown presented the following resolution:

"Whereas, the Senate of the Territory of Hawaii has passed some sixty Acts which have been duly transmitted to the House of Representatives for consideration, and whereas none of said Acts, with perhaps one or two exceptions, have, so far as is known, nor been referred to committees of said House; therefore, be it

"Resolved, That it is the sense of the Senate of the Territory that the clerk communicate with the House of Representatives asking that information be furnished as to the disposition or intended disposition of the several Acts or Bills already transmitted to it."

Senator Brown stated that his reason for introducing the resolution was that the Senate had passed 62 bills, (4 member—Sixty-four), which had been sent to the House but there re-

ceiving no attention, except in one or two cases, beyond first reading. "All of our work, for aught we know, may have gone into the waste basket or the stove. Not only the Senate, but the whole people of this Territory and of the United States want to know what the intentions of the House are. It is said we have a majority of Republicans in the House, but I say if they are not worthy the name of Republican, and the speaker they are read out of the party the better. It is a disgrace to the Republican party that the House is acting in the way it is, ignoring the work done by the Senate and spending its time in petty resolutions, inquiring into executive matters with which the Legislature has nothing to do. Today the Senate will get well through the County Bill and yet from the way the House of Representatives is going on nothing will be accomplished in ninety days and the Legislature will become a laughing stock to the whole country. If we cannot do better than this we ought to shut up shop and go home."

Senator Kalauekalan was heartily in favor of the resolution but suggested it be referred to a special committee, as the Organic Act provided that each house should be independent of the other, adopting its own rules and choosing its own officers, also that each house should pass each and every bill three times. The House committees were holding night sessions and the speaker thought it was striving to overtake business.

Senator J. T. Brown supported the resolution. Many bills had been passed by the Senate and transmitted to the House, but they were ignored and instead the House sent up a number of identical bills as its own. This occasioned his question of the other day, as to whether the Governor was expected to sign duplicates of all acts.

Senator Dickey—"I am opposed to the resolution. I like the old adage, 'Put yourself in his place.' If the House passed a resolution like that, Senator Brown would be the first to jump to his feet on behalf of the privileges of this body. The House has the right to act or not upon any matter coming before it. I don't think it is any of our business and I am opposed to the resolution."
