John Kuanoni, the mate of the schooner Mol Wahine, died suddenly last night from valvular disease of the heart. Kuanoni stayed in port this trip and at about 7 o'clock last night went to visit some friends on Liliha street. The people in the house noticed that he was very quiet in his chair and trying to wake him up were shocked to find that he was dead. The deceased was a son of Captain Kuanoni, the master of the Mol Wahine.

In the Police Court this morning Chin Choon, charged with assault and battery on Tom Sen, was discharged. The two charges against M. J. Freitas, one for malicious injury and one for assault and battery, were nolle prosequi as the complaining witnesses failed to appear. The cases of Tom Honz, charged with profanity and with obstructing the course of justice, were both continued until tomorrow as was also the case of Juan Santano, charged with vagrancy. Uweki was fined \$4 and costs for violating the carriage regulations. Of eleven gamblers, the cases of three were nolle prosequi, two were fined \$15 and costs and the other six had their cases continued until tomorrow. The case of W. M. Campbell, charged with erecting a building without first obtaining a permit to do so from the Superintendent of Public Works, was continued until April 21.

"ESCAPED NUN" DEAD.

Detroit, Mich., March 13.—Mrs. Margaret Lisle Shepherd, "the escaped nun" who for several years delivered anti-Catholic lectures in all countries of the world, and who has had many exciting periods in her career, died in Harper Hospital a week ago yesterday, and her body was buried in Woodlawn Cemetery. Her death and burial were kept secret, one of her few remaining friends giving the excuse that they feared a demonstration might be made at the funeral. She was suffering with malignant cancer, and she died shortly after leaving the operating table. Almost her last wish on earth was that her body be burned. She did not ask for a minister or priest nor for spiritual consolation of any kind. She was an English woman, about 43 years old.

At 8:30 o'clock last night a Japanese named Nagashima came to the police station complaining that he had been assaulted on River street by another Japanese, named Takahashi, who had cut him with a knife. He exhibited a long but not very deep cut on his left fore-arm and also brought a wicked looking, blood-covered knife with a triangular blade. He stated that this was the weapon with which he had been cut. He then left the station house.

At about 10 o'clock Takahashi's wife came to the police station and lodged a complaint against Isoshima, who she said, had cut up her husband pretty badly. It seems that Isoshima got decidedly the worst of the game. He is at present laid up in the Japanese hospital on Liliha street and is in quite a dangerous condition. He has a cut on the head.
