MEMORIAL DAY PARADE TAX EXEMPTION CASE

WILL START FROM EMMA AND BERETANIA AT 2:30 PROPERTY LEGALLY EXEMPT NEED NOT BE RETURNED

SERVICES AT CEMETERY WILL TAKE PLACE UPON ARRIVAL OF PROCESSION—THE PROGRAM.

The Memorial Day procession will move from the corner of Emma and Beretania streets at 2:30 p. m. in the following order: Squad mounted police. Sixth U. S. Artillery. Hawaiian Band. First Regiment, N. G. H. Geo. W. De Long Post, G. A. R. Governor and staff. Orator and reader. Invited guests. General public. Charles R. Frazier will be Marshal of the Day and Henry Judd, Aide.

All of the principal business houses are closed out of respect to Decoration Day and the brave men who died fighting for principle. The principal event of the day will be the big parade of this afternoon, the component parts of which are given above. The First Regiment, N. G. H., will assemble at the drill shed under arms at 1 p. m. The ceremonies at the cemetery will take place as soon as the procession arrives. Following is the program: Music. E. A. Stroutt, Post Commander. Prayer. L. L. La Pierre, Chaplain. Ritual. Post Commander. Music. Walter G. Smith. Oration. Stanley Livingston. Roll Call of the Dead. Jno. W. Francis, Adjutant. Ritual. Chaplain. Decorating Graves. Fred Sherman, Officer of the Day. Salute the Dead. "America." Rev. H. H. Parker. Benediction. The parade promises to be one of the largest seen here in years. There will be in the neighborhood of seventy-five men from Camp McKinley and the militia will be out in full force.

ELEVENTH OF JUNE

The Jockey Club met in the basement of the Hawaiian hotel last night and arranged the following program for the race day meet on the 11th June: First race—One-half mile dash, free for all. Purse \$100. Second race—Trotting and pacing, 2:18 class, best three in five. Purse \$250. Third race—Trotting and pacing, 2:30 class, best two in three. Purse \$200. Fourth race—Five-eighths mile dash, free for all. Purse \$100. Fifth race—One mile dash, free for all. Rosita cup and purse \$200. Sixth race—Trotting and pacing, free for all, three in five. Purse \$150. Seventh race—Three-quarters mile dash, free for all. Purse \$100. Eighth race—Trotting and pacing, Hawaiian bred, two in three. Purse \$200. Ninth race—Pony race, 14 hands or under. Cup, \$25. Tenth race—Gentlemen's driving race, Rapid Transit cup, \$100. Eleventh race—Polo pony race, three-eighths mile dash. Cup, \$25. Twelfth race—Scrub race, one-half mile. Cup or cash, \$25. Thirteenth race—One and one-half mile dash, free for all. Purse \$150. Fourteenth race—Pony race, 13 hands or under. Cup \$25. It was decided by the club that \$10 should be charged up to each outside horse for a track permit. The club received with thanks the offer of a \$100 cup from the Rapid Transit Co. for the gentlemen's driving race, the same to be won twice.

Three separate opinions have been rendered by the Supreme Court, the majority sustaining the tax court's assessment of property on Miller street belonging to Oahu college. The court in an opinion by Judge Galbraith holds that the college is entitled to exemption even though not claimed in the tax return. Judge Perry concurs and Chief Justice Frear dissents. The syllabus is as follows: "It is not necessary to make return for purposes of taxation of property which, by virtue of the provisions of Section 836, C. L., is not subject to taxation, nor to claim in the tax return that such property is exempt."

"A failure to make return and claim of the exemption to the assessor is not a waiver of the right to demand the benefit of the statute. "The valuation of \$25,000 placed on the property by Tax Appeal Court is affirmed. "The college trustees claimed exemption on a part of the Miller street property used for school purposes, which the assessor held was waived by failure to put the exemption in the tax return.

Judge Galbraith says in his opinion that school property is exempt and to hold that there can be any waiver "would be an act of legislation pure and simple and is beyond the rightful power and duty of the court. "Otherwise every property owner would have to make a return whether owning less than \$300 or not. The court continues: "Where property is exempt, it is not subject to taxation and there is no reason for requiring it to be returned and valued. "This interpretation has the support of the construction of the officers whose duty it was to administer the law and usage under it, whatever weight such construction and usage may be entitled to.

"We understand that it has not been the practice to require the owners of exempt property, under Section 836, to return the same; that no return has been required of the property belonging to the Territorial Government or the Queen's Hospital or the Board of Education, or churches and colleges of property in actual use for religious or educational purposes. "Judge Perry in concurring says that only property "subject to taxation" must be returned. He thinks also that the two acres assessed at \$25,000 should not be taxed but says the college did not appeal from this valuation.

Chief Justice Frear holds that the property must be taxed because no exemption had been claimed. He says: "There is a difference between property that cannot be taxed under any circumstances and property that is ordinarily taxable under the law, but which for some special reason is exempt in a particular case. In the one case the property is not subject to taxation at all; in the other case, it may be taxed unless the party entitled to the exemption claims his special privilege and shows that he comes within the exception to the general rule. "The Chief Justice says also that the statute is uncertain and inconsistent in many respects, so that it is hard to learn just what the legislature really intended.
