HOLL'S "MESSENGER"

Holl, the sergeant-at-arms of the Senate, is a most soldierly looking officer and he impresses anyone looking at him when on duty with feelings of great respect, but he has a way of saying things once in a while, particularly when using the English language, which causes hilarity in some quarters and feelings of injured pride in others.

When the regular session of the Legislature began, Mr. Holl was admonished that upon the appearance of the secretary of the Governor dressed in a style that would indicate he had a message from the Governor in his inside pocket, to stand up in a soldierly attitude at the entrance to the Senate chamber and say in an impressive voice: "Mr. President, a message from the Governor."

Holl acquiesced at once and watched with beating heart for the first appearance on the scene of the man from the Governor's office. At last, one bright morning, the secretary to the Governor put in an appearance with a bulky manuscript under his arm. Holl straightened himself up and got as close to the wall as possible in order not to be in the way of the man from the Governor's office. When Mr. Hawes had arrived opposite to him, Holl suddenly cried out: "Mr. President, a messenger from the Governor." This naturally did not please Mr. Hawes very much but it sent some of the senators off into fits of laughter.

SECRETARY'S WARNING.

Secretary Carter has warned claimants and witnesses in the Chinese fund matter that they will be held strictly accountable to the law for any false representations which might be discovered, hoping that this warning will be all that is required to insure the fund against fraudulence, as far as the matter is in his control.

The mortuary report of the Board of Health for May shows seventy-two deaths. Of these, 24 were Hawaiian, 13 Chinese, 10 Portuguese, 12 Japanese, 3 British, 8 American and 2 other nationalities. The causes of death are summarized as follows: Fibrile, four; diarrheal, three; venereal, two; dietetic, three; constitutional, seventeen; developmental, five; nervous, six; circulatory, six; respiratory, nine; digestive, ten; urinary, five; reproductive, one; accident and violence, one.

HOUSE JOURNAL HOUSED

POLICE FINALLY SERVED AS GUARD FOR DOCUMENT

LOUCKS DIDN'T WANT TO SIT UP ALL NIGHT WATCHING IT. ANDREWS SAFE TOO SMALL.

When Judge Gear's court adjourned about 5 o'clock Friday afternoon after protracted argument in the County Act case, the journal of the House of Representatives stood high and bulky on the desk of Clerk Loucks, a formidable mass of typewritten matter, precious as being the records of the regular session of the House and an exhibit in the matter of the Board of Public Institutions against Superintendent of Public Works H. E. Cooper.

A long legal argument and many technical questions had been necessary to determine that the big bunch of copy constituted the House journal and the documents had been admitted as evidence in the case under the general objection of Attorney General Andrews that such evidence as the record of a legislative body, going behind the signature, was inadmissible. The House had sent a communication to the Court early in the afternoon, as announced in Friday's Bulletin, demanding the immediate return of the journal and altogether, the heap of manuscript was attracting a great deal of attention.

Clerk Loucks was at a loss what to do with the journal. He could not leave it on his desk; it might be stolen in the still watches of the night, or fire or rats might devour all that the House had accomplished in regular session.

The Court did not relish the idea of having to be responsible for the journal and Attorney General Andrews was requested to place the record in his official safe in the Capitol. The Attorney General smilingly disclaimed the honor, explaining that the official safe was not large enough to receive the House journal. There was no room in the safes of the Territorial Courts for the papers, they were already too full, thousands of valuable papers not having any accommodation in the court strong boxes as it is. The clerk of the Federal Court had gone home and his safe therefore could not be used. The United States Marshal's office was tight shut and the tax and other offices in the Judiciary building were also deserted. Clerk Loucks didn't want to sit up all night and watch the journal, so the High Sheriff's office was finally communicated with by telephone and arrangements were made for the housing of the documents until they should again be required. Loucks took a receipt for the papers from Deputy Sheriff Chillingworth and was able to go home with a light heart.

This morning at 9 o'clock the County case was continued and the House journal again stood high on Clerk Loucks's desk.

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
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
