PUNAHOUS ARE CLIMBING UP

The first game of baseball on Saturday last was between the Honolulu and Mailes, the former winning by a score of 8 to 2. The game was a fair one but costly errors were made by short and left, thus permitting the Honolulu to get more runs than should have been their portion. Only five hits were made off Hardee, while Joy was tapped for six.

The second game was between the Kamehamehas and Punahous and up to the eighth inning, there was played the best ball that has ever been put up on the new grounds. The Kamehamehas made some very costly errors and were slow in throwing, otherwise the result would have been different. Up to the eighth inning, the Kams had not made an error and not a hit had been made off Reuter.

For some reason or other, the Kam pitcher suddenly let down and the Punahous rapped him at will, bringing in five runs. A glimpse of the old-time luck was caught in the ninth inning when with two men out, Kekuewa lined out a two-bagger and succeeded in making the run which prevented a shut-out.

The game by innings was as follows:

FIRST INNING. Forbes out, second to first. Steere, base on balls. Lishman flew out to left. Steere, second on wild pitch. Hemenway struck out.

SECOND INNING. Sheldon first on error by short. Lemon flew out to first. Jones struck out and Sheldon stole second. Vannatta singled to right and the ball was thrown to third. Sheldon had this base safe but foolishly played too far off. The ball was thrown to third and Sheldon was finally caught after several throws back and forth, Hemenway scoring the put out.

THIRD INNING. Tucker for the Punahous went out on a foul fly to catcher. Judd struck out. Woods out, pitcher to first. Reuter, for the Kams, out second to first. D. Kekuewa flew out to left on a grand-stand catch by Tucker. Plunkett struck out.

FOURTH INNING. Marcellino out, pitcher to first. Castle struck out. Tucker followed suit. J. Kekuewa flew out to right. Richards struck out. Sheldon first, error by short. Lemon flew out to third.

FIFTH INNING. D. Kekuewa, two-bagger into right. Plunkett flew out to center. J. Kekuewa first hit by pitcher. Richards struck out. Sheldon went out to catcher on a foul. The Punahous crawled out of an extremely small hole.

SIXTH INNING. Castle went out on a grounder to first. Forbes struck out. Steere flew out to right. Lemon out, second to first. Jones struck out. Vannatta out, short to first.

SEVENTH INNING. Lishman out, third to first. Hemenway struck out, pitcher to first. Tucker flew out to pitcher. Reuter singled into right. D. Kekuewa struck out. Plunkett sent a single into left. Reuter tried to go to third, the ball was thrown wild to second and on the return he made the bag, Plunkett going to second. J. Kekuewa out, pitcher to first. Richards struck out.

EIGHTH INNING. Judd, base on balls. Woods, base hit to first. Marcellino flew out to pitcher, who threw wild to second and Judd went to third. Castle to first for return to plate and Judd scored. Forbes to second to plate and Woods safe. Castle to third and Forbes to second. Steere flew out to second. Lishman, two-bagger into left and Forbes and Castle came in. Hemenway to second for error, Lishman came in and Hemenway went to second. Tucker flew

out to center. Sheldon for the Kams, flew out to short. Lemon, went out on a foul fly to Marcellino. Jones out, second to first.

NINTH INNING. Judd struck out. Woods flew out to third. Marcellino flew out to short. Vannatta went out on a foul fly to catcher. Reuter out, second to first. D. Kekuewa made a three-bagger into right. The ball was thrown wild by second to first and the crack catcher of the Kams came down the stretch for the first run of the day for the school side. Plunkett flew out to second and the game was ended.
