FOREIGN FIRMS MUST OBEY LAW

Have Failed To File Articles With the Treasurer.

ATTORNEY GENERAL IS SENDING OUT WARNINGS

NON-COMPLIANCE WITH REQUIREMENTS CONSTITUTES MISDEMEANOR—PROCEEDINGS IF NECESSARY.

There is the possibility of numerous foreign corporations, doing business in this Territory, being prosecuted by the Attorney General's Department on charges of misdemeanor, for under this head comes the failure of such business institutions to file with the Territorial Treasurer copies of their articles of incorporation, charters, by-laws and similar documents.

The Territorial law, as ordained by the last Legislature, makes it a misdemeanor for corporations chartered outside of the Territory and doing business within the Territory to neglect to properly put themselves on record with the Treasury Department.

This Department has acquainted the office of the Attorney General with the facts as they exist and it is said that but one foreign corporation engaged in business in the Islands has complied with the requirements.

Notices are now being prepared in the Attorney General's Department, to be sent to all agents and representatives of corporations of the mainland and elsewhere, carrying on business here, calling their attention to the requirements of the law and allowing them ten days in which to remedy conditions.

The one corporation said to have already come up to the requirement is the Phoenix Loan & Savings Association of San Francisco, of which Robert Slaughter is general agent.

Some of the firms alleged to be delinquent in the matter are the Seattle Brewing & Malting Co., the Union Oil Co. of California, the Dearborn Drug & Chemical Works, the Risdon Steel & Hardware Co.

Among others mentioned are the Western Sugar Refining Co., Pacific Oil Transportation Co., Marvin Safe Co., New Home Sewing Machine Co., and the Fulton Iron Works.

Corporations which have not complied with the law are barred from bringing suits at law and have not the rights of corporations duly identified in the archives of the Treasurer's Department.

Unless, within the time specified in the notices now being sent out, the delinquents appear to satisfy the law, proceedings will be instituted for misdemeanor.

The law's purpose is to protect the public by providing for its possession of all facts relative to firms carrying on business in the Territory.

It is expected that the notices of the Attorney General will be all that is necessary to reform present conditions.

POPE PIUS ISSUES NEW ENCYCLICAL

Rome, Oct. 4.—The Osservatore Romano publishes tonight the text of an encyclical by Pope Pien X. commemorating Leo XIII. The encyclical, the first issued by Pope Pius, is entirely religious in tone. The most interesting part of it is as follows:

"We proclaim that we have not in the supreme pontificate any other program than to gather all things in Christ, so that Christ shall be all in all. There will not be lacking those who, measuring divine things by human laws, will try to discover what are the secret interests of our soul. We say to them that we do not wish to be, and, with divine aid, shall not be, before human society other than the minister of God, of whose authority we are the depository. The interests of God shall be our interests, for which we are determined to spend all our strength and life itself. If it were asked, in order that we may gather all things in Christ."

His holiness recommends the education of the young, particularly by the clergy, and expresses the hope that Catholic societies may spread in the cities and throughout the country, and give an example of Christian life. He declares that obedience to law and submission to the government are the duty of all citizens.

The encyclical closes thus: "It is evident that the church instituted by Christ must enjoy full and entire independence."

INDICTED FOR SLAVEHOLDING

The Federal Grand Jury Makes Partial Report.

ILLEGAL IMPORTATION AND FORGERY BILLS

TRIAL JURY PANEL TO BE COMPLETED THIS AFTERNOON. FAMOUS CHU KIN CASE.

Federal court was impressively opened this morning by the admission of Christian J. Hedeman to citizenship.

"Is he a good man," asked Judge Estee of the two sponsors who stood one on either side of Mr. Hedeman. "He is," was the answer.

"And do you think he will make a good citizen?"

"He will," was the reply.

"You know that each citizen of the United States is a sovereign and takes part in the government of the country. The court does not indicate whom you shall vote for, but the court does indicate that a man should vote for only good men," remarked the court.

Dr. J. S. B. Pratt and W. T. Smith vouched for the new citizen, who was born in a province of Denmark.

The grand jury, by Foreman Atwater, announced a partial report, returning four indictments, one of which was ordered placed on the secret file.

Judge Estee thanked the grand jurors for their early report and excused them for further investigations.

Indictments returned were as follows: United States vs. Chu Kin, alias Jue Gun, alias Chu Kan, charged with peonage; United States vs. Immanuel Claudino Puig and Francisco Lebrun, charged with forgery of material signature and endorsement upon a United States postoffice money order; and United States vs. Chokichi Hayashida, charged with violation of the Act of March 3, 1903, bringing contract laborers to the United States.

Chu Kin, the first case mentioned, has already occupied considerable attention by his slavery connections. He is alleged to have held Jung Hing, sometimes called Jung Hung, a Chinese woman, to a condition of peonage, threatening to kill her and compelling her to lead a life of prostitution, against her will, making her pay over to him her miserable earnings.

It will be remembered that the woman was released from slavery on the habeas corpus proceedings instituted in Federal Court by a Chinese who stated that he was engaged to Jung Hing. She and her two babies and an old Chinese nurse later figured in Judge Gear's court, Chu Kin trying to obtain the woman's children, claiming them as also his, on habeas corpus. An alleged marriage in China was gone into at length and Chu Kin, the man of the aliases, failed to get the babies.

There are four counts in the indictment against Chokichi Hayashida. He is alleged to have attempted to bring

BRITAIN AND FRANCE AGREE TO ARBITRATE

DEMURRER SUSTAINED.

Judge Gear this morning sustained defendant's demurrer in the case of the Territory vs. Yoki, a Japanese woman indicted for perjury.

Yoki, by her attorney, J. W. Cathcart, contended that the indictment did not state facts sufficient to constitute the crime alleged or any other crime under the laws of the Territory and the United States Constitution.

The indictment charged that Yoki swore before District Judge Davis that one Yoshikawa had aided her in soliciting; that she swore falsely.

NEW STEAMER TO AUSTRALIA

Tacoma, Oct. 5.—R. A. Alley returned today from London, where he concluded arrangements for the inauguration of a new trans-Pacific steamship line between Tacoma and Vancouver and Australian ports. The headquarters of the line will be in London, but its stockholders include a number of wealthy Australians and New Zealand planters and wool-growers.

Three steamships have been chartered, and a fourth one will be added if it is decided to stop at New Zealand ports. The steamship Maru Kin is to be the first steamer on the route, and is now undergoing a thorough overhauling at Cape Town. She goes to Australia first, and will arrive here about December 20th. Monthly sailings will follow. Negotiations for a cargo from New Zealand are in progress.

If brought to a successful issue steamers will call at New Zealand ports from the beginning. Sydney, Melbourne and Brisbane will be the Australian ports of call. It is intended that one of the chief articles of shipment from Australia will be raw wools, for the use of a woolen mill employing 700 hands to be established by the Auxiliary Company on Chambers creek, eleven miles from Tacoma.

OBJECTED TO ANDREWS.

According to citation to show cause why attachment should not issue against him, H. E. Hendrick appeared in Judge DeBolt's court this morning. Attorney General Andrews appeared for Hendrick. C. C. Biting represents J. C. Axtell, who was awarded \$5,000 damages for malicious prosecution, by a jury in Judge Robinson's court recently.

Andrews wanted to proceed immediately with the matter in hand, but Biting objected, saying it was not shown that Andrews was retained in the case; besides he had a case in another court and asked that the matter be continued. Continuance was ordered until Friday.

SPECIAL VENIRE.

U. S. Marshal E. R. Hendry was ready before 2 o'clock this afternoon with return in the matter of the special venire of eighteen ordered this morning by Judge Estee to complete the Federal trial panel.
