GERMANY MAY HELP.
Paris, Feb. 13.—It is stated here that in the event of the defeat of Russia, Germany will make a diversion favoring her.

TORPEDO-BOAT SUNK.
Port Arthur, Feb. 13.—The Russian torpedo boat Yeniser accidentally struck one of the mines with which the harbor is defended and was sunk. The captain of the boat and ninety-four of his crew were drowned.

PORT ARTHUR FOR JAPAN.
London, Feb. 13.—It is believed that the Japanese will capture Port Arthur within a week.

The Daily Telegraph says the Admiralty has warned eligible retired naval officers.

TROOPS ORDERED READY.
St. Petersburg, Feb. 13.—The Czar has issued a ukase commanding that all troops in the eastern divisions of the empire be held in readiness and brought to their full strength.

200 DROWNED.
Chenulpo, Feb. 13.—When the Russian cruiser Varag sunk, 200 men were drowned and 370 escaped to foreign vessels in this harbor.

MERCHANTMAN SUNK.
Tokio, Feb. 13.—Russian warships attacked two Japanese merchantmen on the coast of Alompor, sinking one. The other escaped.

FIRING AT SEA.
Tientsin, Feb. 13.—It is reported that firing has been heard at sea, 150 miles northeast.

RUSSIA WANTS LOAN.
Paris, Feb. 13.—Russia is negotiating a loan in France.

THE QUEEN'S MONEY.
Washington, Feb. 13.—The Senate considered the Lillookalani appropriation but took no action in the absence of a quorum.

HANNA RALLIES.
Washington, Feb. 13.—Senator Hanna has rallied.

McKEOWN SENTENCED.
Berkeley, Feb. 13.—McKeown, the embassizing secretary of the University board, has been sentenced to seven years' imprisonment.


