NISSHIN AND KASUGA The origin of the names Nishin and Kasuga, the two war vessels sent out from Naples for the Japanese navy and reported safe and sound at their home port yesterday, is very interesting. Some thirty-six years back, when Japan had no navy whatever and when the advance of western civilization seemed to menace the very life of Japan, two Japanese daimios, or feudal lords, conceived the plan of protecting the coasts by the use of war vessels. They therefore had constructed two wooden vessels and armed them with the best implements of modern warfare it was possible to secure. These two boats were named the Nishin and Kasuga, the former meaning "New Sun" and the latter "Spring Day." Kasuga is the name of a Japanese god, whose shrine is still in existence at Nara, near Osaka, on the Island of Itoodo. The name of one of the daimios who paid for the construction of the war vessels was Mon. These two wooden vessels are now in the last stages of decay and yet they formed the nucleus of a navy which is now proving its superiority over that of the czar. In order that they and what they represented might not be forgotten, the new vessels were named the Nishin and Kasuga.
