**ALL HOPE NOT DEAD**  
 As Yet  
**FOR EXHIBIT AT FAIR**

There is still a chance that Hawaii may have an exhibit at the World's Fair and it is understood that everything hinges on the conference between the Governor and Commissioner F. W. Macfarlane, which is scheduled for a few days hence.

During the last three weeks or more, matters pertaining to the exhibit of Hawaii at the fair have been in statu quo, but during the last few days those interested in a proper advertisement of the islands have been very active in their demands that there shall be a decent showing made, even though the finances of the country at the present time are at a very low ebb.

It is known that the Governor intends to get into the appropriation bill and cut here and there so that the expenditures will be within the limit of the receipts expected and it is argued by those who believe that the time above all others to advertise is when business is dull, that the Governor should do chopping enough to admit of the expenditure of at least \$15,000 for the exhibit of Hawaii at the fair.

Mr. Funston, one of the commissioners of the St. Louis Exposition, is a guest at the Young Hotel and he says it will be a great shame if Hawaii does not make an exhibit. How else will the country ever get before the great public of the United States? The majority of people who have any interest in Hawaii are out for an exhibit and they do not want it to be exclusively educational, either. They want at least a part to be characteristic.

But, as has been suggested, the whole question is up to the Governor. If he approves of the expenditure of

**CONSUL'S CASE TODAY.**

H. B. M. Consul Hoare's application to Judge Gear for the apprehension of German sailors of the British bark *Cian Buchanan*, alleged deserters, comes up at 4 p. m. today. The matter was called this morning, but the sailors were apparently without counsel, not being represented in court.

Asked as to the whereabouts of their representative, the sailors replied that they wanted Judge Humphreys. Judge Gear explained that the judge was not practicing in Territorial courts and ordered the bailiff to telephone Mr. Humphreys in regard to the facts. The reply was that Attorney Crooks would appear for the alleged deserters. Judge Stanley represents the British Consul.

**MAUI HOME RULERS**  
 FOR COMBINATION  
**WITH THE DEMOCRATS**

Waikuku, Feb. 27.—The Home Rulers and Democrats will meet at the skating rink this evening for the purpose of selecting delegates to the convention at Honolulu to take place the coming month. It is rumored that the object of the delegates to Honolulu would be for the purpose of looking into the advisability of a coalition between the Home Rulers and Democrats, and presumably the extinction of the former as a political factor in this Territory.

Leading Democrats of this district are inspired with that view, but at the same time they realize the hard battle they would have to fight with such an old staid politician as Senator Kalaualani, who views the new movement as nothing less than an aim to deprive him of the leadership of the Home Rulers with which party he had been associated since its inception as a powerful political institution here.

The Home Rulers are cognizant of the fact that while the Democrats are few in number, yet their brain power or intellectual capacity far exceeds the Home Rulers, in the other words, the Home Rulers furnish the voters while the Democrats furnish the brains, and hence the de facto leadership. The Republicans will await with interest the result of the coming combine.

As previously stated, the test will be an appeal from the Auditor's refusal to issue a warrant for the payment of a bill for printing tax blanks.

Today is pay-day for Government employees, being the last of the month. The usual crowd lined up at the Treasury office and received cash for their salary warrants.

**Finance Situation**  
 Says Carter  
**Certainly Alarming**

"That the financial situation is alarming, I have no doubt," said Governor Carter this morning.

"I realized this before I went away on the Hawaii trip. But the situation was so much better than it would have been under the County Act that it may have appeared better than it really was."

"I have gone carefully through the six months' bills, checking off those appropriations that are general or for repairs, in this way trying to get down to the limit where we can work successfully."

"I have turned the matter over to the Auditor for footing up and entering."

"As soon as this footing is accomplished we will be in a position where we can plan what to do."

"We must do something."

"We will see the bankers when we have these footings and are in a position to know how to move."

The Governor was busily engaged this morning on financial and other matters.

Deputy Attorney General E. C. Peters, head of the Attorney General's Department in the absence of Lorrin Andrews, will probably file papers this afternoon in the test case in Supreme Court in regard to proving the legality of proceeding according to appropriation acts which have lapsed for authority to pay necessary expenses of the Government not provided for in appropriations for the period since the ending of last year.

**SLAVE GETS DIVORCE**

Judge Robinson this morning granted Shizue Kawakami a divorce from Matadzo Kawakami.

Shizue is the Japanese woman who was several times sold. Torazo Miramura now serving two years as a Federal prisoner for holding the little lady in slavery.

The husband was indicted by the Federal grand jury but was never secured.

**GEAR TO DECIDE**  
**FATE OF GOTO**

Goto's habeas corpus case came on before Judge Gear this morning.

Goto was convicted of selling liquor without a license, without grand jury indictment, and sent to Oahu prison. J. W. Cathcart, representing Goto, holds that Goto, convicted of a misdemeanor, is confined in Oahu penitentiary, where he must mingle with felons and receive the same treatment accorded felons and that, inasmuch as he receives punishment identical with that administered to persons convicted of infamous crime, he is treated as a man guilty of infamous crime and not as a misdemeanor, and that therefore his punishment is illegal and he is wrongfully confined; that he should have been indicted by a grand jury as is required by the Constitution. If he is to be punished for a crime that is rendered infamous by the mode of punishment.

It is the old question of what is Oahu prison—penitentiary, jail or house of detention. For all purposes, as a matter of fact, the celebrated building is being used in every imaginable way that a prison can be used.

Felons and misdemeanants are confined under the same roof as are also detained witnesses and persons committed for trial—Territorial and Federal.

Deputy Attorney General Peters appeared for the Territory; Cathcart for Goto.

Peters called High Sheriff Brown and Warden Henry to the stand.

These gentlemen told all about the rules and regulations and discipline of Oahu prison.

They said that, as far as possible, felons and misdemeanants were kept separate; they were confined in separate cells; eat at different tables; were kept separate by guards in the prison yard; wore different garbs—felons being adorned with blue and white horizontal stripes.

**ROBBED OF RICE**

Walker's rice mill, back of Kawaiahao Church, was last Saturday night robbed of about half a ton of rice. The robbery was reported to Deputy Sheriff Chillingworth, who sent Officers McKee and Akana Espino to watch the place. At about 9 o'clock two Chinese, Chu Sen and Akwai, came prowling about. The officers gave chase and caught the men. On their persons were found a hatchet and a number of keys. The men were brought to the station house, where they were locked up for investigation.

Officers McDuffie and Makeha this forenoon searched a room on Vineyard street where the prisoners lived. A number of razors and keys were found, also a sharpshooter's medal and a couple of Chinese medals.

**KOHALA SUGAR CO.**

The Kohala Sugar Co. held its annual meeting in the assembly hall above Castle & Cooke's this afternoon, the following officers being elected for the ensuing year: C. M. Cooke, president; M. P. Robinson, vice president; E. D. Tenney, secretary; C. H. Atherton, treasurer; C. H. Cooke, auditor. E. E. Gidding continues as manager.

The manager reports as follows:

Crop of 1903—This was harvested from area of 715 acres plant and 560 acres of ratoon cane. The yield was 5040.5 exceeding the estimate given in the report for 1902 by 740.5 tons. The largest yield obtained was from an irrigated field of 140 acres of Rose Bamboo cane, being 7 tons of sugar per acre.

Crop of 1904—This will be from an area of 826 acres of plant and 730 acres of ratoon cane. The yield is conservatively estimated at 3300 tons. 200 tons of this crop were harvested in December, 1903. This is not included in unreported sugar; expenses of harvesting and manufacturing are included in crop account of 1904.

Crop of 1905—1176 acres are under cultivation for this crop, which is looking exceptionally well, and with good growing conditions should produce a crop equal to that of 1903.

Varieties of cane—The Yellow Caledonia seems the best suited to the varying conditions of soil and climate found here.

Improvements—A cane unloader and twenty-five cars for handling and storing cane at the cane carrier was completed.

**GIANT POWDER WAS**  
**USED FOR FISHING**

News came by the W. G. Hall on Sunday of the giant powder explosion at Waimea early last week. The police investigated, Sheriff Coney and Deputy Sheriff Rice making the trip to the place as soon as they received the news.

A thorough investigation was made and it was found that the theory advanced that an attempt had been made to blow up a number of Japanese in a house near the beach, was not borne out by the facts.

That an explosion did take place under the house was fully demonstrated for the place itself gave abundant testimony of such an occurrence and one of the occupants who was sleeping at the time, was slightly injured, the others escaping with a bad fright and a severe jolting of their internal economies.

The people living in the house were all fisher folk and it is believed that they secured the giant powder for fishing purposes, hiding it under the house in order to escape the curious gaze of whomsoever might happen to be around.

It is further supposed that one of the fishermen must have been down under the house smoking and perhaps dropped a cigarette butt which in some way caught a fuse and caused the explosion.

A person seeking to blow up a house would naturally have used a long fuse to allow him time to get away but all the fuses found by the police were short, showing that the powder was meant for fishing purposes. No particulars could be learned from the occupants of the house themselves.
