MRS. CALHOUN'S DEATH. A Seattle paper contains the following regarding the death of Mrs. Sarah Calhoun, whose death occurred April 1. Mrs. Sarah Calhoun died at her residence on Maple avenue at about 10 a. m. yesterday. She had been feeling badly for some time, but it was not thought that her condition was so serious. She passed away as if going to sleep and before a physician could be summoned.

Her husband, Capt. Rufus Calhoun, died at San Francisco last December. She leaves to mourn her loss three sisters in the East, one daughter, Mrs. J. M. E. Atkinson, of Seattle; Isaac P. Calhoun, of Kent; R. C. Calhoun, who is in Mexico, and Capt. Geo. S. Calhoun, of the American ship Geo. Curtis, now in San Francisco. Mrs. Mary Calhoun, of this city, is the widow of her son, John J. Calhoun, who was a member of the firm of Calhoun & Coleman in this city at the time of his death in 1890.

The relatives have been notified by wire, but can not reach here until today noon, when arrangements will be made for the funeral. Mrs. Calhoun was a native of Massachusetts and was married to Captain Rufus Calhoun in Lowell in 1859. Her maiden name was Fillmore. In 1854 she joined her husband in California, he having sailed around the Horn the year previous. In 1866 with her husband, she came to Port Townsend, where she resided till the day of her death. Mrs. Calhoun was exceptionally active in affairs for one of her age, and having exceptional ability exercised a great influence in her circle of friends, of whom perhaps no one in this community had more. Her loss will be mourned by the community in general.

SALVATION ARMY'S FAREWELL TO SOLDIERS The local corps of the Salvation Army, under the leadership of Ensign Bessie Haynes, Capt. C. Hornshuk and Lt. A. McClellan, have arranged for a special farewell service to be given the officers and men of the 66th and 67th companies U. S. Coast Artillery now stationed at Camp McKinley, prior to their departure for San Francisco on the next transport arriving from Manila. About two years ago, Maj. Edward Davis, at that time post commander, opened the way for the Army to hold meetings once a month at camp. This has been allowed also by Lt. Col. John McClellan, the present commanding officer. It is needless to say that the work among the men has been greatly appreciated by them. The officers of the local corps visit each transport as they arrive and distribute War Crisps and other reading matter to the officers and men. The local corps has always had the most liberal support from the men in the Camp, hence the farewell. The work among the above-named has the endorsement of such men as Lieut. Genls. Miles, Young and Chaffee of the American service, Lord Roberts and Woolesey of the British service, and the late Count von Waldseeck of the German army. The Army and Navy League throughout the world has a membership of over 7000 of which over half are non-commissioned officers, which speaks well for the Salvationists. Calvin P. Titus, the bugler who carried the American flag over the walls of Peking, was a Salvationist and is today one of the religious leaders at the West Point Military Academy, he being awarded a cadetship by reason of his act of bravery. This service will be very useful and instructive and all persons interested in the welfare of our nation's defenders are invited to attend. C. J. Day, president of the Y. M. C.
