WORLD NEWS BY CABLE

RUSSIAN CAVALRY.

St. Petersburg, Oct. 1.—The Russian cavalry have checked the Japanese advance in the direction of Yangsungtung and Fengtiapu. They have also burnt seventeen junks in the Hun river, carrying ammunition.

ARMIES INACTIVE.

Mukden, Oct. 1.—Inactivity continues on both sides.

FIRE DESTROYS AMMUNITION.

Sebastopol, Oct. 1.—A fire in the artillery ammunition magazines will, it is feared, cause considerable loss of life.

JOE JEFFERSON RETIRES.

New York, Oct. 1.—Joseph Jefferson, the veteran actor, has announced his retirement from the stage.

HUMBERT FINALE.

Paris, Oct. 1.—The Humbert creditors have received one-half per cent. of their claims.

PAYNE UNCONSCIOUS.

Washington, Oct. 1.—Postmaster General Payne is unconscious.

FAREWELL TO BALTIC FLEET.

St. Petersburg, Oct. 2.—The Czar will visit Reval on Tuesday, to bid farewell to the Baltic Squadron.

MINES SINK SHIPS.

Tokio, Oct. 2.—It is reported that a Japanese gunboat has been sunk south of Liatong by a mine. Part of the crew was rescued. A Russian steamer clearing away mines at Port Arthur has been sunk.

BATTLE LINES FACE.

Tokio, Oct. 2.—There are four divisions of Russians at Mukden, two at Hunho and the remainder at Tieling. The three Japanese armies occupy a front extending twenty miles north of Liaoyang.

JAPANESE USE RAILROAD.

Newchwang, Oct. 2.—The first train over the re-constructed railway has left for the south with 500 wounded Japanese.

FLOODS DESTROY.

Las Vegas, New Mexico, Oct. 2.—Half of the town of Watrous has been destroyed by floods. Twelve persons were drowned. The loss is \$100,000.

STREET CAR ACCIDENT.

San Francisco, Oct. 2.—A score of persons were thrown from a street car here. One was killed, another receiving fatal injury, and thirteen were severely injured.

BOSTON CHURCH HORROR.

Boston, Oct. 2.—The floor of the Catholic church at Adams collapsed, precipitating fifty of the worshippers into the basement. Twelve were injured.

EARTHQUAKE IN ITALY.

Rome, Oct. 2.—An earthquake accompanied by rains has been experienced in Southern Italy.

LADY CURZON BETTER.

London, Oct. 2.—Lady Curzon, who recently underwent an operation, is recovering.

PAYNE BETTER.

Washington, Oct. 2.—Postmaster General Payne is better.




