Boyd had told me that he would give me \$5.00 if I would turn over to the Republican side and help them, and \$10.00 more if the Republicans won the election; he was to pay me that night, and that was why I stayed down. Boyd returned from Waikane with Joe and Pahlia, and they went into Adams' house, the School agent, opposite the Court House. The window was open and I stood outside and had the benefit of their talk. Boyd said to Pahlia, "Roland Watson is all right and I am to see him tonight;" Pahlia said "You had better look out for him, he will get away with your money, but he is a hard-headed fellow and will not change his opinions or his vote." They had a bottle of square face on the table drinking from it at the time. Just then the clergyman came along, saw me outside and went in and reported I was outside. Pahlia called me in and then went home. Boyd said to me "I would like you to look over this list of Democrats and Republicans in this district that has been made by me on the statement of Joe Lere, who has agreed to come over onto our side. I should like you to look over that list and see if it is correct." I said, "Well, I want to get something from you first," and then Boyd commenced to back out and turned the conversation and finally dropped the whole matter. What Pahlia said to him had evidently made him "skittish" about giving me money, and nothing further was done.

I am a Home Keeper, but attended the Republican meeting last Friday at Kaneohe Court House. After the speechmaking was over and while the candidates were still there I saw the jailor bring out the wine and pour it into buckets and from there people were invited up to dip it out in glasses. At the time this wine was furnished Mr. Bishop and Mr. Dowsett had stepped into the store next door and were having their dinner. As they came out from dinner and stood outside of the Court House yard the drinking was then going on. The schools were closed for the day and the two school teachers were there at the meeting, and a great many children were also present when the drinking was going on, and were also present when some of the people were intoxicated.

Well, the jailor, had a wagon that was used to go and get people to come to the meeting and to take them back home. I was on that carriage and I and the driver took one drunken woman home from the meeting about four o'clock. We took her down to her home, which was near to the clergyman's place, who is luna of the road, and the driver and another man had to carry her into her house.

I heard a great many personalities during the speechmaking, and particularly remember J. M. Dowsett's personal attack upon Kinney, in which he charged that Kinney had taken \$10,000.00 from an old man who was a client of his and had put it into his pocket.
