Kams Defeat High School At Punahou


The interscholastic football game at Punahou field yesterday afternoon between the Kams and the High Schools resulted in a victory for the Kams in a score of 12 to 5.

FOR FORTIFICATIONS.

Notwithstanding some discussion as to the right of the United States to take over the streets in the acquisition of land at Kaimuki for fortification purposes, Lieut. Slatery, Engineer Corps, U. S. A., states that the Government is acquiring the desired property, streets and all. These thoroughfares have never been turned over to the Territory and the trustees find nothing to prevent the turning over of the streets required to the War Department. The War Department takes over forty-nine acres as a single block, including all rights of way which will now be closed. The Government pays about \$31,000 for the property. Negotiations for Walkiki beach property are undecided, pending settlement of a difference of opinion as to price. At a luncheon the U. S. Government acquires 329 acres for which about \$80,000 will be paid.
