GENEAU TELLS STORY REGARDING TROUBLE WITH KENNARD. (Continued from Page 1.) Kennard for leaving dirty clothes about. Three weeks later he found Geneau grinding hash in a sausage machine in such a manner that his perspiration dropped in the hash. A few days later Lieut. Commander Parmenter ordered Geneau to see that Kennard took a bath every day. Kennard did so but always managed to be under the shower at the time when Geneau wanted to bathe. Kennard was placed in charge of the bath house in order to promote his personal cleanliness. He did not keep it clean and Geneau reported him. A little later Kennard complained that the pay clerk sold coffee and sugar ashore. Geneau reported him for using disrespectful language about an officer and he was given five days in the brig. On another occasion Kennard had hidden away in the log room, where Geneau slept. Geneau did not like the idea of the negro sleeping there, as he did not like his odor, especially as he had not taken a bath since he left Samoa nine days before. Geneau awoke Kennard by dropping a bag on him. Geneau further stated that he had met Harris on Oct. 13, 1903, when he was passing through on his way to Samoa. He met Harris at midnight on the dock, to which Harris had escorted the ship's cook, who was his friend. Harris asked Geneau to take some messages to some friends he had at Pago Pago. The conversation was only a casual one. Later on he saw Harris at Pago Pago when the negro passed through on the Sonoma as coal passer. Harris and Geneau had a casual conversation about some friend Harris had ashore. When Geneau returned to Honolulu his feelings towards Harris were quite friendly. On June 29, 1904, Geneau had shore leave in Honolulu. He took a walk about town in the afternoon. He remained ashore that night. In the morning he woke up in the cow-pen back of Oahu jail, which led him to believe that he must have been drunk. The forenoon of the 30th was spent in different saloons. He drank cocktails, gin fizz, beer and whiskey. At noon he went back to the ship, remaining there for fifteen minutes.
