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Victory For Mailes In Hot Game Iolanis Beaten, 3-1

A fast and exciting game was played between the Mailes and Iolanis at the Baseball Park Saturday afternoon before a meagre attendance. Both teams were somewhat rearranged, Mon Yin making his debut for Iolanis and Bailey for the Mailes. The game started in fine style, Iolanis being the first to attack swooping down on the Maile stronghold and testing the goalkeeper with some rattling good shots. Steady defensive work however repelled the attack and the Mailes backs transferred the scene of operations to the other end where Kellet was called upon to save. As the game progressed play improved, neither team sparing themselves and the game was interesting to watch, the forwards on both sides covering ground rapidly. Their efforts to break through the respective defense divisions were nullified however and midfield exchanges took place for some time. Quickly getting into their stride and by means of a well executed passing movement, the front rank of the blue and whites again invaded foreign territory and gave the Maile custodian a spell of knee drill, he having to get down smartly to stop some of Woo's and Fernandez's hot grounders. Still attacking in force the Maile citadel, Williams centered opportunely across the goalmouth and Woo nimbly securing the leather, with a beautiful screw shot sent the sphere hurtling between the posts, making the score Iolanis 1, Mailes 0. Nettled by this reverse the green and gold quintet by dint of a combined attack immediately romped down to their rivals' quarters and were successful in getting within range, the equalizer being soon forthcoming. Kellet, the stalwart back, in attempting to clear, mis-kicked making an opening from which Churton scored, equalizing matters. The Blue and Whites immediately dashed away on the left and tested the Maile goalkeeper through Williams, the custodian having to concede a corner which resulted fruitlessly. Throwing off the pressure the Maile forwards transferred the venue of play to the Iolanis territory and their defence was kept on the qui vive for some time as the ball bobbed about in front of goal, but score the forwards could not. Sending the Mailes to the rightabout, the Iolanis again attacked, but dallying tactics robbed them of good chances. The Spasmodic runs of the right and left wings of the Iolanis gave Greig and Beardmore some trouble and they had to be on the alert all the time. Midfield exchanges occurred for a time although Iolanis were down at the Maile goal whenever an opportunity presented itself. Nothing resulted from these visits and half-time arrived with the score: Iolanis 1, Mailes 1. On the resumption of hostilities the green and gold brigade started in operations towards their rivals' goal, Fiddes making the initial run and his partner shot just skirting the bar. A few minutes after Churton secured possession of the ball from an opportune center by the outside left and, passing timely to Harwood, the latter neatly converted, thus putting the Mailes on the lead. Continuing their improved play the Maile forwards directed a fusillade of shots on the Iolanis goal and it was only in accordance with expectations that a third goal was netted by Harwood with a well taken header from a well placed center in the mouth by Fiddes, resulting from a corner. This reverse had the effect of making the Iolanis put more vim into their play and their strenuous efforts to even matters were worthy of the highest praise. Runs and counter runs were inaugurated by the rival forwards and each goal visited in turn. From a foul in midfield Greig placed in the Iolanis goalmouth but the Blue and White backs happily averted danger by transferring play to midfield. A determined attack by the Iolanis forwards to increase their score merited success and had they shot offener for goal instead of flinching in outfield they would have changed the complexion of the game materially, the Mailes' defending tactics at this time being characterized by a lot of haphazard work and lack of cohesion. Beardmore was very effective in cleverly tackling and clearing the raids of the Blue and White right wing and Greig also accounted successfully against the nimble pair representing the left wing. With about five minutes to go Churton was prominent in some brilliant solo work and nearly succeeded in adding another goal to his credit but Kellet supremely diverted at the critical moment. Harwood was as tricky as ever, feeding his partner as with a spoon. At this stage the Iolanis had many chances to reduce their leeway through the Mailes slackening up, but failed to take advantage. The combination of the front rank of the Green and Gold brigade was at times faulty, some of the inside men lying too far back, resulting in several opportune crosses from Fiddes going begging and also allowing the rival backs time to clear. Woo and Mon Yin for the Blue and Whites showed clever footwork, their artistic touches delighting the spectators. The Iolanis halves were rather ragged in their play and apt to wander out of their area, forgetting that their sphere is to break up the opposing attack and judiciously feed their own forwards. Up to the end the Blue and White forwards were

full of running and always dangerous, but the Mailes showed good generalship by pulling back the halves to strengthen the defense when they got a goal in hand, evidently proving to the lesson the Punahou gave them last week of the game never being decided until the whistle blows. The Iolanis van was very effective and it was not their fault that the game resulted as it did. The back divisions of both teams were safe and reliable, Guild and Anderson being very instrumental in the breaking-up play and judicious feeding of their forwards and proved a strong barrier to the spirited attacks of their opponents. A rousing game should be witnessed between the Iolanis and Punahou next Saturday. The teams are training hard, the one to avenge their recent defeat and the other to repeat the dose if possible.

TEN HAWAIIANS STRUCK

BONOLULU IMPORTATION NOT A SUCCESS ON KAUI

PUBLIC WORK GOING FORWARD AT WAHIAWA—McBRYDE PREPARING UPPER PLANTATION LANDS.

[Special to The Bulletin.] Wahiawa, Kauai, Jan. 25.—The ten Hawaiians that were sent here from Honolulu to work on the Wahiawa concrete bridge have struck work. They say they are underpaid by the contractors. The few picked up from around Hanapepe continue to work on the approaches of the bridge. The contractors of the Lualaba concrete arches are steadily making headway. The present Public Works Department officials are to be commended for being thoughtful of this particular section of Kauai's highways which has been in much need of attention for a while back. With the Lualaba and Wahiawa streams spanned by concrete structures and the Kalahao spacious and modern school buildings and teachers' cottages this part of the Garden Island looks civilized. The McBryde steam plows now have been turning over sods of some of that estate's upper lands in order to better the feed for its stock and also enrich the soil. L. L. Mann, the McBryde civil engineer, is back after having been absent for three months. His trip to the Western States has benefited him so that he looks like a new man. The popular assistant bookkeeper of McBryde, Allan M. Doyle, severed his connection with the plantation on the 1st of February. It is understood that he will then be found as head all-around men for H. A. Jaeger, the contractor to harness power at Waihiha for the Hawaiian and Kauai Electric Companies. All regret losing the company of such an agreeable, jolly and gentlemanly young man. H. A. Jaeger commences in a day or two to construct two immense reservoirs for the Koloa Sugar Company. An accident befell an unfortunate Japanese last Friday in which his skull was fractured in two places. The man jumped or fell off a cane car bumper through his own carelessness. He lived but a short while. A coroner's inquest was held at Eleale and that body's decision was accidental death through carelessness. Solomon Kaluna, one of Wahiawa's most respected Hawaiians, died of droupsy last Friday, leaving behind him a number of children, grand-children and friends to mourn their loss. Never there was such a long spell between deep sea vessels for this port. Since the departure of the barkentine Encore, ten vessels saw only one vessel here in sight last month and that was the Koko Head bound for Makawell. Just as this epistle is about to close the barkentine Flint rides into the Eleale harbor with coal for McBryde and might take sugar from here.
