SENATE FINISHES WITH LOAN BILL

Sweeping Cuts Made To Get Act Within Estimate.

EXTRA SESSION. EIGHTH DAY.

The Senate this forenoon finally finished the third reading of the Loan Bill and managed to cut it to a considerably lower figure than it previously presented. Heretofore the cutting of the items of the bills was almost impossible. All the members were willing to cut, more than that, they were falling all over themselves in their eagerness to cut, but they would not cut the items concerning their own islands. When a cut of Hawaii items was mentioned Paris stood up and held forth like unto a lioness protecting her cubs, while Wilcox and Gandall zealously guarded Kauai's interests. The Maui people said little, but sat very firm in the saddle. Under these circumstances the total of the bill soared skywards in an alarming manner. The Oahu members finally stood forth as noble examples of self-sacrifice and started in cutting Oahu items in the hope, expressed openly, that the other island delegations would follow the lead. The result was that all the outside island Senators began computing their own appropriations and the bill's total dropped quite considerably when the bill finally passed third reading.

An invitation from the De Long Post, G. A. R., asked the Senators to participate in the Memorial day celebrations. The clerk was instructed to answer thanking for the invitation and stating that if by that time the Senate was still in session the Senate would attend in a body. Hewitt introduced a resolution from the protract club at Kauai as follows: Whereas, the Republican Party, in

its platforms of the past and by the utterances of its leaders all the time, is pledged to increase and continually foster the means of Public Education in this Territory, and Whereas, the party pledges in this matter should be fully kept. Therefore, be it resolved, That we urge that liberal and fully adequate appropriations be made for the schools of Hawaii, and for their efficient continuance, as, from the education of our people our future will depend. Fourth Precinct Club, 2d District, Hawaii.

The resolution was referred to the Education Committee. House Bill 6 was referred to a special committee of Achi, Woods and Dickey. This is the bill on unpaid bills of the season of 1903.

House Bill 7 was referred to a special committee of McCandless, Hewitt and Hayseiden.

Loan Bill Again. The Loan Bill was taken up for third reading. The bill was read in full, when Woods moved to strike out the \$15,000 item for a road from Heia to Kahului via Ahulmann. The Superintendent of Public Works had said that this appropriation was ridiculous and would only tie up so much money. At least \$60,000 was needed to build that road.

Ahulmann Road Cut Out. McCandless said he knew more of that road than the Superintendent of Public Works who had only been at Koolauko twice in the last two years. McCandless said the present road was very poor, while the new road would be of great benefit, especially for the tourist travel.

Dowsett said the road would be a nice improvement, but he felt \$15,000 was not enough. He thought it should be cut out, but beyond that the Senators from the other islands would follow Oahu's example and cut appropriate

Message Received. A message from the Governor appointed Dr. W. D. Mays, M. P. Robinson and Dr. Judd on the Board of Health and Dr. Grossman on the Board of Dental Examiners. Action was deferred until tomorrow.

Achi moved to cut out all road appropriations with the exception of the belt roads. He thought in this way the bill could be cut to \$1,000,000.

Cuts Thick and Fast. Paris moved to cut the Hilo government building to \$25,000. Carried. Bishop's motion to cut out all the government buildings was lost.

Paris moved to strike out the \$1000 item for a road from Hookena to Keala. Carried.

Dickey moved to reduce the item of government buildings, Maui, from \$25,000 to \$10,000. Hayseiden amended it to \$15,000. The item passed at \$15,000.

Dickey moved to reduce the Maui schoolhouse item from \$15,000 to \$13,000. Carried.

Wilcox moved to amend the item of \$25,000 for Kauai government buildings to \$10,000 for a courthouse and jail. Carried.

Paris moved to make the Waiohina courthouse \$2000 instead of \$5000. Carried.

Kalama moved to reduce the Kona courthouse item from \$8000 to \$5000. Carried.

Lane moved to pass the bill third reading as amended. Carried by a vote of 9 ayes and 5 noes, the latter by Isenberg, Kalama, McCandless, Dowsett and Woods.

The Senate adjourned until 10 a. m. tomorrow.

MAUNA LOA IN PORT

The island steamer Mauna Loa arrived early this morning from Maui, Kona and Kau ports, bringing 23 cabin passengers, 51 deck and a cargo including 6474 bags of sugar, 29 head of beef cattle, 34 bags of coffee, 69 bunches of bananas, 44 bags of awa, 23 bales of hides, 27 pigs, 1 horse and sundries.

The Mauna Loa brings news that three heavy earthquake shocks were felt on Hawaii on Wednesday. The lake at the volcano is growing every day and several new cones have formed in the crater.

The Mauna Loa experienced fair weather with several showers on the outward trip until Kau was reached. Here it was very stormy. The weather moderated so that by Sunday cattle could be loaded at Punaluu. Dry weather is reported at Pahala, on account of which planting has stopped.

There has been no rain in Kau for a week past. Fine weather and light showers have prevailed along the Kona coast since the first of May, greatly benefiting the coffee and fruit.

Captain Zeeder, who succeeds Captain Seabury, in command of the Pacific Mail liner Korea, while the latter is on leave of absence, was master of the Alga, and passed through here on the Coptic, two weeks ago, to take the Korea to the Orient.

The Pacific Mail liner Siberia continued her voyage to the coast at 5:30 last evening.

On his way from Hilo Bowman stopped at the Volcano House on his way across to Kau. He states that Madame Pele is still doing business at the old stand.
