WORLD NEWS BY CABLE

CHOLERA IN PRUSSIA. Berlin, Sept. 1.—Today 43 new cases of cholera and nine deaths were reported in West Prussia. The scourge is thought to have come from Asia through Russia.

SCOURGE IN GALICIA. Vienna, Sept. 1.—The cholera scourge has appeared in Galicia.

TREATY WILL BE READY. Portsmouth, N. H., Sept. 1.—The treaty will be finished by the legal advisers of Japan and Russia tomorrow, ready to be submitted to the plenipotentiaries for signature.

ENGLISH EXPRESS WRECKED. Witham, England, Sept. 1.—The London and Cromer express has been wrecked. Ten persons were killed and twenty injured.

SWEDISH-NORWEGIAN SPLIT. Karlstad, Sept. 1.—It is reported that the Swedish proposals are not acceptable to the Norwegians.

ROBBED OF NECKLACE. Brussels, Sept. 1.—A valuable necklace belonging to a daughter of Russian Peace Envoy Witte was stolen from her at the theater.

ROBBERS TAKE \$100,000. New York, Sept. 1.—Thieves have plundered the residence of Jose Armaris of property valued at \$100,000.

POSTOFFICE REGULATIONS AND EMPLOYEES' DEBTS

Postmaster J. G. Pratt received the following in yesterday's mail: Office of the Postmaster General, Washington, D. C., Aug. 8, 1905. Order No. 150.

The Post Office Department will not harbor anyone who contracts a debt on the strength of his official position and then without sufficient excuse neglects to make payment.

"But, at the same time, the department will not permit itself to be used as a collection agency, and will not participate in the collection of debts of employees. It will take no cognizance whatever of a debt against an employe so far as a creditor is concerned, beyond a simple acknowledgment of the receipt of his communication thereon to make payment.

Creditors and collectors will be denied access to employes for the purpose of presenting or collecting claims during the hours set apart for the transaction of public business.

Upon receipt of a debt complaint at the Post Office Department, it will be referred to the proper head of bureau, for a report in writing from the employe. Appropriate action will then be taken by the department.

Appendicitis Caused By a New Theory

Washington, Aug. 7.—Another theory has been advanced regarding the cause of appendicitis. Painstaking investigation has led the surgeons away from the suspected grape seed, which was at first supposed to seek the appendix, and from various other articles of food to a danger altogether outside ordinary diet.

Dr. Pond of Liverpool publishes in the London Lancet a new theory with reference to the origin of appendicitis and other disturbances of the digestive organs. He calls attention to the fact that such ailments often can be attributed to antimonial poisoning and the source of the antimony taken by man is said to be the rubber rings frequently used to close all sorts of bottles.

Dr. Pond has established the fact that these rings consist of almost one-third their weight of antimony. Not only is the antimony dissolved by mineral waters, alkalies and organic acids, but the rubber rings, as daily observation shows, soon become brittle and some of the compound falls into the contents of the bottles.

In a series of observations, Dr. Pond claims to have found that the frequently repeated introduction of antimony can become a source of a series of disturbances of the nutritive and digestive system, especially through continued weakening of the muscles of the stomach and intestines.

Scientists have taken up the matter of antimony in rubber rings, and if Dr. Pond's conclusions in that regard be proved, his deductions concerning the effect of antimony on the digestive system may be supported by the reports of other investigators.
