WARM DISCUSSION ON REVENUE BILL

Speaker Cannon Consents To Have Bill Reported

DELEGATE KURIKO'S LETTER ON WASHINGTON AFFAIRS

COURSE THE CRITICISM OF THE BILL IS TAKING—TIME LIMIT OF THE BILL HAS BEEN CHANGED.

Editor Evening Bulletin:—Since my last letter influence brought to bear upon Speaker Cannon, has resulted in his yielding so far as to consent that our Revenue Bill should be reported by the committee.

I accordingly secured a committee meeting, and the bill was considered yesterday in an executive session which included considerable warm discussion. The leading opponent of the bill charged that its main purpose was to lighten the taxation of the rich people of Hawaii. This charge I warmly denied, showing that the rich people can get along very well under the present conditions, and insisting that the main purpose of the measure was to benefit the general citizenship of the Territory by means of better school buildings, the opening up of lands for settlement by the construction of new roads, and the general benefit to the community by returning a portion of our revenue to be spent in the islands.

The chairman cited the action in favor of Porto Rico as a precedent for this legislation; but the opponents of the bill now seek to shift their argument from the question of precedent into a general opposition to the establishment of a treasury fund for the benefit of one Territory.

After a considerable discussion the sub-committee were instructed to amend the bill, limiting the term to five years and make it begin July 1 next, instead of July 1, 1905, and to prepare a report upon the same to be resubmitted to the full committee for final action.

This does not fully assure us a favorable report, although I am hopeful that a report can be secured within the next few weeks.

Further conversation with some of the leading members of the committee develops the fact that while they are friendly to the bill to some extent yet they have not been sufficiently convinced of our needs to make them earnest partisans of the measure, and it is this half-hearted attitude, which just now is giving me the greatest concern. It is apparent that some of the opponents of the bill are going to fight it very hard, and without equally enthusiastic support upon the floor, its chances will not be very good. We can, however, rely upon the strong support of Col. Cyphers, and some other members of the House, who favor the bill more strongly than does the average member of the Territories Committee.

It still remains to be seen whether we shall be able to get the bill up for consideration, after it is reported in the House. We shall not try to cross that bridge until we reach it, being sufficiently engaged now in the problem of securing the report. We are now working with the sub-committee on the preparation of the form of the report, which is to be acted upon by the full committee.

Quarantine Filing.
The delay in having instructions called to Honolulu for the \$20,000 appropriation for filling Quarantine Island, has been due to the fact that this appropriation was made not by a separate bill, but by a rider attached to the Urgent Deficiency Bill. As this does not specify its method of expenditure, it was necessary to secure an opinion from the Comptroller of the Treasury in order to proceed without advertising for bids. That opinion has already been received and I have shown the indorsement made by General McKenzie, for submission to the Secretary of War, recommending that a certain maximum price per cubic yard be offered the contractors and that if they were to refuse, the appropriation should be allowed these instructions to Lieut. Slattery, as soon as the formal signature of Secretary Taft is obtained, and they will doubtless reach there long before this letter.

The Committee on Elections having

charge of the contest against my seat, took formal action on Wednesday and adopted a unanimous report sustaining my right to a seat in the Fifty-ninth Congress; printed copies of this report will be available by a later steamer.

Upon the advice of a number of members and Senators, most interested in Hawaii, I have introduced a separate bill, providing for the purchase of a site for a Federal building at Honolulu, as they all advise that it would be impossible to secure an appropriation for both a building and site at one time. Senator Scott particularly advises this course as the only means by which he was able to secure a building for the Capital of his own State. We are to be given a hearing on this bill tomorrow before the House Committee on Public Buildings.

hire, mileage of members, incidentals, pay of chaplain, clerk, stenographers, and messengers, thirty thousand dollars; Provided, That the members of the Legislature of the Territory of Hawaii shall not draw their compensation of two hundred dollars, or any mileage, for any extra session held in compliance with section 54 of the Organic Act of the Territory of Hawaii.

As will be seen the proviso added by the Committee prohibits any extra compensation or mileage for any extension of the regular session of the Legislature for passing appropriation bills. This is not intended to prohibit compensation for a special extra session on call of the Governor for purposes other than passing appropriation bills; a conversation with Chairman Tauney shows that they never expected that under the Organic Act any extra pay would be given for an extension of the regular session, it being their purpose to make a clear distinction between such extensions of the regular session of the Legislature, and special sessions convened by call of the Governor for extraordinary purposes.

FORTIFICATION MONEY

Washington, March 26.—In less than twenty minutes' time the Senate today passed the pension bill carrying \$140,000,000.

When the fortifications bill was taken up Teller moved an amendment striking out the provision for the fortification of the Philippines. Allison and Lodge declared their willingness to support such a motion.

Newlands spoke in support of the proposal to eliminate the Philippine island from the present plans for fortifications.

After further debate the Teller amendment was adopted—25 to 23—and on motion of Clay the appropriation applying to sea-coast defenses in the Hawaiian Islands was reduced to \$260,000 to correspond with the estimate for those islands.

BABBITT TELLS OF NEEDS OF SCHOOLS ON KAUI

Superintendent Babbitt of the Department of Public Instruction returned this morning from a tour of inspection on Kauai, where he incidentally looked up the matter of arranging for school facilities for the children of the Molokai settlers at Kapaa.

"We want a new school at Kapaa," said Babbitt this morning. "It will have from eight to ten rooms and two cottages. We will try to get four acres of land for it."

"This is the school which will accommodate the Molokai children, though it is not being built expressly for them. There are at present only sixteen Molokai children of school age. The new school will be centrally located, so that it will be easily accessible from both Keala and Kapaa. I did not personally see the Molokaians, but obtained my data and information regarding them from J. B. Castle, of whom the Molokaians think a great deal and the plantation."

"We furthermore want a new two-room school at Keala with a teacher's cottage. We are also to open a new school at the Hanalei school in the teacher's cottage."

"We have already placed a new teacher, Miss Mabel Wilcox, in the Lihue school. This is a six-room school, but heretofore only five rooms have been open."

At Hanamaulu we are changing the location of several buildings and making repairs. The new room at Makawell is ready for occupancy. Pipes are to be laid on the lagoon and the location of the outhouses changed. We also want more land for the Kalahae school."
