SEISMOGRAPH RECORD AT EWA OF SAN FRANCISCO QUAKE

After much difficulty the Bulletin this morning got into connection with the United States Magnetic Station on the plains toward Barbour's Point.

Records of this station show any tremor to which the earth's surface may be subjected, the instruments being the most delicate.

When the first message was sent out, the clerk in charge said that the news from the Bulletin was the first he had heard of the San Francisco earthquake. He immediately started in developing the films on which the seismograph record is made. He then telephoned the following to the Bulletin:

"To BULLETIN, Honolulu: Seismograph shows that vibrations commenced at 2:50 this morning and continued strong for six minutes. Continued less vigorous until about 6:15, when normal condition was restored. This report is only approximate, as record was read while tape was still in machine.

"R. E. NYSWANDER, Clerk in charge U. S. Magnetic Station, Ewa, Oahu."

This goes to show that the earthquake damage in San Francisco was done by the first shock, which probably destroyed the efficiency of the water system and gave free way to the fire.


