## HAWAII PROMOTION WORK WILL GO ON

### San Francisco Trouble Will Not Hinder Committee

Promotion work in Honolulu will not suffer as a result of the earthquake in San Francisco, according to sentiments expressed by some of those who are conducting the work. It is their belief that there is just as much need for advertising Honolulu now as ever, and they will endeavor to let the world know that in Honolulu can be found as safe a place to live, as well as congenial environment, as any where in the world.

As several members of the committee were engaged yesterday afternoon in collecting funds to send to San Francisco, the regular meeting of the committee did not take place, but the next weekly meeting will be held as though nothing unusual had happened. No special meeting will be called of the committee between now and the time for the regular session, unless something of unusual importance comes up to demand it.

Literature is being prepared and mailed every day by the Committee to every part of the United States, and during all the excitement occasioned by the San Francisco catastrophe this work went merrily on.

It is believed by some citizens that the San Francisco trouble will only give more confidence on the part of the general public in the safety of the Hawaiian Islands. No great calamity has ever occurred here, it is pointed out, and while floods, blizzards, tidal waves, earthquakes and other death-promoting occurrences are being experienced in other parts of the world, Hawaii has enjoyed entire safety.

### "The College Widow" Practices Dressing

With everything in perfect readiness, the new scenery, effects, etc., just in order, and the cast well up in their work, the dress rehearsal of "The College Widow" last evening was a most satisfactory one. The college scenes are most natural and very pleasing, and the football act, where in the big game between Atwater and Bingham Colleges takes place, is very true to life and holds the interest perfectly.

The costume, college colors, stage decorations, etc., all unite in making some very pretty pictures productive of most pleasing results. Following the old customs, they are marching all over town with Old Elam Hicks of Squantumville as their leader, tearing down billboards and generally celebrating in the good old way.

### VENTURA SAILS

With every berth taken, the S. S. Ventura departed last night for San Francisco on the time originally set, 5 o'clock. This is probably the biggest load of citizens from Honolulu that ever departed for the Coast on any vessel. The larger majority of those going are leaving to hunt up relatives in San Francisco, and to give them all the aid in their power. In addition to the large number of passengers, the Ventura took from Honolulu 5500 bags of sugar, 200 bags of rice, 1500 bunches of bananas and a variety of other freight. She also had on board \$30,000 in money for relief of sufferers in San Francisco.

This remittance totals \$30,000. The drawings on the Frisco banks are made by time drafts for reasons which you will readily understand. While this remittance is being made up, more money is coming in, which can go forward until the next steamer. We are confident that you can expect at least \$20,000.00, additional, at that time.

Please take notice that at a meeting of the General Committee this afternoon, it was voted that one-fourth of all the money sent to you be turned over by you, half and half, to the Japanese and Chinese Consuls, respectively, in San Francisco, for the relief of their countrymen; so that of this present remittance, you will please pay, at such time and manner as meets your approval, to

## YACHT RACE WILL BE AS WAS PLANNED

"Will the trans-Pacific yacht race be called off as a result of the earthquake?" is a question that is being asked in Honolulu. Secretary Wood, of the Promotion Committee thinks that the people of San Francisco will want to show to the world that it has not lost its vitality by its recent misfortune, and that yachtsmen of that city will endeavor to aid in getting the race started.

"The date for the beginning of the race is some distance away yet," said Mr. Wood this morning, "and by the time it arrives San Francisco will have recovered to a large extent from its excitement. The race is set for May 19, and I feel quite confident that it will take place as originally planned."

Tom Hobson, who is one of the greatest enthusiasts in Honolulu concerning the race, departed yesterday on the Ventura. While he made no statement to that effect, it is confidently expected that he will use his influence while away in getting the present program for the race carried out in detail. It is probable, according to the opinion of some of those interested in the event, that much good could be done by immediate correspondence with the various people who had planned to enter the race.
