



OLAA LIQUOR MEN BRING TROUBLES TO Arbitration Board

Another liquor row from Hawaii, which, like the famous Waimea case, seems to originate from the rivalry of competing saloon men, is now getting ready for settlement by arbitration. John D. Souza is the appellant. He applied for a fifth-class liquor license for Nine Miles, Oloa, but was turned down by the Treasurer, as his application was not signed by a majority of the adjoining property owners, and as there was a protest against the issuance of the license signed by a majority of the voters of the precinct. Later on, he filed an affidavit containing the names of additional property holders, but this was after the license had been refused.

INATTENTION CAUSES TRACHOMA OUTBREAK

The Free Dispensary is getting ready for a new campaign against trachoma among school children. During the vacation the number of patients calling at the dispensary dwindled down steadily, until at last none called. Today the opening of the schools caused a number of patients to come for treatment. There were no less than thirty from the Kohakaina school alone, and many more are expected from the other schools. As a consequence a thorough inspection of all the schools will be made. It is feared that owing to the inattention paid to the disease during the vacation, the advances made by it will be found to be great.
