

CONFERENCE ON CONVENTION WORK

The committees from the Fourth and Fifth Republican Districts which were appointed to confer on permanent organization of the County Convention met at Republican headquarters at 12 o'clock today to prepare their report to their caucuses. The report will be submitted at 5 o'clock this afternoon.

The members of the committee for the Fourth District are W. W. Harris, J. W. Jones and Mr. Kales. Those for the Fifth District are H. C. Vida, John C. Lane and Naganan Fernandez. No report of the proceedings of the committee meeting will be made public until the meeting at 5 o'clock this afternoon.

The committee from the Fifth proposed a compulsory secret balloting and insisted upon their point. The delegation from the Fourth favored the secret balloting, but would not concede to its being made compulsory. The whole matter is now in the air, and unless some understanding is had on the point before Friday by the representatives of the two districts, the buck will be passed up to the Committee on Rules of the County Convention next Friday.

RECOVERS WATCH GIVEN BY QUEEN

Detective Miki of the local police force, has recovered a watch belonging to Aimoko, one of Queen Liliuokalani's suite, which had been given him by the Queen herself. The watch is valued at \$300 and was originally owned by Governor J. O. Dominis. About a week ago the watch and a number of articles of apparel were stolen from the royal apartments and until last night there was no clue to their whereabouts.

Miki happened to go into a saloon looking for a suspicious character, who is wanted by the police, and found a young Japanese who formerly worked for the Queen trying to pawn the watch to the bartender. He promptly took the watch away and will arrest the thief, who acknowledges that he is guilty, as soon as a warrant has been sworn out.

PALAMAS GOLD FEET

The championship baseball game of the second series between the C. A. C. and Palamas, to be played on Regatta Day, is now all off. It was agreed on Monday between the two teams that they play on that day. Notwithstanding that the Baseball League through Manager Falk, has offered them the grounds, umpire and balls, the Palamas backed out. The C. A. C. are champions of the first series and tied with the Palamas in the second, and the C. A. C. are anxious to play the tie off.

This is a splendid chance for them to show the skill of the members of both teams, as there is some good material in them. The game played out in the League park will be a fair game, as there will be no crowd around the diamond to interfere with the ball and players, as it is out in Aala park, where the games of the Riverside League have been played. Somehow or other the Palamas got cold feet and say they don't want to play on Regatta day. It is to be hoped that the Palamas will reconsider their decision and play the game like clean sportsmen.

LOCAL AND GENERAL

James Lyle and Karen S. Sorenson, doing business as the firm of Sorenson & Lyle, have filed a libel in admiralty in personam against the Pacific Mail Steamship Co., for \$1500 for services rendered in unwinding from the propeller of the steamship Siberia a wire cable which became entangled therein. Geo. A. Davis is proctor for the libellants.

The case of Ramon Martin, a Porto Rican charged with stabbing a Hawaiian with a knife, was disposed of in short order before Judge De Bolt this morning. The defendant was accused by the Hawaiian of stealing chicken eggs. An altercation ensued, during which the Porto Rican used a knife. The jury brought in a verdict of guilty after about three minutes' deliberation, and Judge De Bolt sentenced the defendant to two years' imprisonment, the maximum sentence.

RULING MAY CAUSE LOSS OF REVENUE

De Bolt Issues Mandamus Against Registrar Merriam

Judge De Bolt this morning rendered his decision in the case of Albert Trask against Registrar Merriam, granting the relator's petition for a writ of mandamus and issuing the same. Thereby Merriam is commanded to record a certain deed, which he refused to record on the grounds that he wished it shown by affidavit that the consideration expressed in the deed, was the only one given.

Under the law stamp fees are paid on the recording of deeds in proportion to the amount paid for the property therein. Thus deeds wherein the consideration is above \$500 pay for a \$1 stamp and those above it pay more on a rising scale. It has been the custom of the Registrar in cases where he thought that the consideration expressed in the instrument was not the actual and full amount paid, to demand an affidavit showing that it was such.

In the Trask case Merriam demanded such an affidavit, but Judge De Bolt in his ruling holds that such a demand cannot be enforced, except in cases of sugar plantations, rice lands and a few other similar cases, for which special provision is made by law. The court holds that the consideration expressed in the deed is sufficient evidence. By this it will be possible for people who record instruments to evade the payment of stamp duty above \$1 by expressing merely a nominal consideration therein. In this manner the Territory is liable to lose a large part of the revenue it derives from the record office. The Attorney General's Department intends to appeal the case to the Supreme Court.
