KOREAN CONVICTED IN TEN MINUTES

Y Man Young Is Found Guilty Very Quickly By Jury

CASE DRAGGED OUT BY LAWYERS FOR DEFENCE

CRIMINAL AND POLITICAL CASE WHICH TAKES UP NEARLY TWO WEEKS IN COURT IS COMPLETED

Y. Man Young, the Korean who has been the cause of so much trouble and whose case has been used very strongly for political effect by the morning paper and Attorney Lightfoot, was found guilty of assault with intent to commit murder, by the jury which has been listening to the testimony in his case for the last two weeks. It took less than ten minutes for the jury to arrive at their verdict, which may result in a \$1000 fine and ten years in jail for the Korean.

Y. Man Young shot and badly wounded a fellow countryman, named Chung Sung Duck, on March 12 last, mistaking him for a rival in love named Choy Uk Chay. The real story of the criminal in the love affairs of Choy Uk Chay and Y. Man Young, who, according to testimony put on the stand during the trial, were both familiar with Mrs. Emmeluth, for whom they had worked as servants.

The prosecution furnished the motive for the crime in this manner and then besides strong circumstantial evidence brought out the confession of Y. Man Young, made to Assistant Sheriff Vida, in the police station. On this point came the great struggle and the defense tried to bar out the testimony in regard to the confession on the ground that it had been obtained by means of threats and violence. The matter was fought over for two days, Attorneys Cathcart and Fleming winning the battle for the prosecution.

Then the entire story was placed before the jury and Vida gave his side, which was supported with strong testimony from other sources, while on the Korean's side was only his word which the prosecution showed again and again to be worthless, by many lies in which he was caught. The jury at least, seemed to take this view of the case though Messrs. Lightfoot and Noar held the Korean up as an example of truth and virtue to them and to the general public.

The case was carefully dragged out over election time in order that no lot of the political effect of the charges which were made against Vida by Magoon should lose force but has at last been completed. In regard to this attorney was heard to say yesterday that with lawyers on the other side he wished to hurry the case it could have been completed in three days instead of nearly two weeks.

KING'S BIRTHDAY TODAY



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BRYAN WORKED FOR FINANCING OF PACIFIC EXPLORATION

W. A. Bryan, who six months ago resigned his position as curator of the ornithological department of the Bishop Museum of this city, has returned from a several months' trip abroad and in the States, whither he went for the purpose of awakening interest in an ethnological and biological survey of the islands of the Pacific ocean.

The plan for this gigantic undertaking, which if carried out will be of vast importance to the realm of scientific research throughout the world, has met the heartiest approbation of the leading men of science and men prominent in the educational world, both in Europe and the United States, and Mr. Bryan feels great encouragement. He is now in Honolulu with the intention of interesting local people in the enterprise.

"All agree that the scientific problems with which it is proposed to deal in the Pacific are most important and that the problems presented in these regions require immediate study because of the rapidly changing conditions. There ought to be no delay in the matter," said Mr. Bryan to a Bulletin reporter this morning, in speaking of his recent trip.

The plan as it is now formulated contemplates making Honolulu the scientific center for the undertaking and if it is carried out it will be of inestimable value to the Hawaiian islands. It will bring here prominent men of science from everywhere and it cannot help being a fine thing for Honolulu.

The undertaking will be in the nature of an international one of the broadest possible scope and will open up avenues of research in the Pacific islands never before attempted. The eyes of men of science throughout the world are on this movement and there will go up a ocean of praise from the heart of every loyal devotee of science should the present plan be brought to successful culmination.
