


NO PAY FOR SOLONS FOR EXTRA SESSION

Would Mean Loss of The Government Appropriation

Should the legislative session extend past the sixty days, the \$30,000 appropriated by the Federal Government will not be lost to the Territory—provided the legislators do not draw pay for the extra session.

Such is the opinion of Secretary Jack Atkinson in reference to the question raised last night by W. T. Rawlins at the joint meeting of the Republican Central Committee and the Republican members of the Legislature for this island.

The clause of the appropriation bill providing the \$30,000 for the expenses of the Legislature reads as follows:

"For legislative expenses, namely: Furniture, light, stationery, record castings and files, printing and binding, indexing records, postage, ice, water, clerk hire, mileage of members, incidentals, pay of chaplain, clerk, sergeant-at-arms, stenographers, and messengers, thirty thousand dollars: Provided, That the members of the legislature of the Territory of Hawaii shall not draw their compensation of two hundred dollars, or any mileage, for any extra session held in compliance with section fifty-four of an act to provide a government for the Territory of Hawaii, approved April thirtieth, Anno Domini nineteen hundred."

From the above, it may be noted that none of the money is to go toward paying the salaries of the legislators, but is all for incidental expenses. And it will not be enough for all of them. The Legislature will have to appropriate enough money to make up the difference, as well as to pay the salaries of its members.

But it is the opinion of Secretary Atkinson that the law does not allow of the Legislature appropriating money to pay the salaries of its members for any extra session.

Another thing which is not mentioned in the list of legislative expenses for which the appropriation may be used is interpreting. The question as to whether or not the legislature has the right to make an appropriation for this purpose is still an open one and no solution of the difficulty has yet been found.

The fact that if the session runs longer than the sixty days the members of the Legislature will have to work without extra pay or else lose the appropriation made by the Federal Government is thought to make it extremely probable that sixty days will be the limit of the session.

HAKALAU LANDS TO BE OPENED SOON

Settlement Associations Have Applied For All

The Hakalau lands of Hawaii are to be opened up for settlement soon, probably within the next seven weeks. There are two large sections of the lands. One is the Kaiwiki III tract, containing 1,765.79 acres; the other is the Opea-Peleau tract of 445.4 acres.

There is another tract, the Lepelou-Kaula, containing 308 acres, which has not yet been reported upon by the survey department, but the report will be made before a great while.

Land Commissioner Pratt has received the maps and surveys of the two first-named tracts.

The Osoiro Settlement Association, consisting of twenty-six members, has applied for the Kaiwiki III section. The tract has been divided into 55 lots of from 21.05 acres to 52.17 acres. Forty-one of them are in cane and the rest will have to be cleared.

The Opea-Peleau lands are wanted by the Lihan Association. They have been divided into 19 lots of from 25.5 to 50 acres each. There are 17 members of the Lihan Association. The Fernandez Association wants the Lepelou-Kaula lands.

Miss S. Tracy of Waikiki was a passenger on the Mauna Loa from Honolulu to Napooppo.

John K. Sumner, plaintiff in an action against the Territory to establish a fishing right, today filed a discontinuance of the action.

The motion to dissolve the injunction in the case of Middleitch vs. Kaminianole was continued this morning by Judge Lindsay until Thursday.

J. H. Gibson, plaintiff in summary proceeding of landlord and tenant against K. Kagawa, defendant, has withdrawn his appeal in the cause.

Purser J. L. Friel of the Mauna Loa reports the following sugar on hand on Hawaii: Punaluu, 1435; Paauhau, 1,990; Puako, 1450; Kukalaui, 1550.

The matter of exceptions from the Circuit Court in the case of F. J. Testa vs. J. P. Kahalawai et al. was argued before the Supreme Court this morning and submitted.

The motion to dismiss in the case of Harry T. Mills vs. John S. Walker was granted this morning by the Supreme Court. In the same matter, the exceptions from the Circuit Court were stricken from the calendar.

Saturday night a real Hawaiian regatta will be given at the Royal Hawaiian Hotel under the direction of Princess Theresa Whiteoak. It will be served in the old-fashioned style with no forks, spoons or knives, and will be followed by an old-time hula. There will be no charge made for the last mentioned feature.

The Mauna Loa, arriving this morning from Maui, brought the following freight: 5619 bags H. sugar, 606 bags coffee, 62 bags beans, 141 bundles hides, 19 barrels dried fish, 28 barrels oranges, 75 bunches bananas, 13 kegs butter, 26 hogs, 34 head cattle, 4 crates chickens, 2 cows, 1 calf, 2 donkeys, 199 packages of sundries.

The larger part of the freight which came yesterday afternoon on the Hongkong Maru was most welcome to the local sugar planters. It consisted of 700 tons of gunny sacks or nearly 250,000 sacks and they have arrived some too soon, as some of the plantations were almost entirely out of their regular stock, and were using nitre sacks or anything else which they could lay their hands on.

The news reached Honolulu for the first time yesterday of the death of Superintendent Hawhurst, who for many years has been in charge of the Pacific Mail docks in San Francisco. He had been in the employ of the company for 42 years when he passed away. There were few men on the waterfront in San Francisco, who did not know the "Old Man," as he was familiarly called and he was liked by all.

MERCHANTS TO DISCUSS PAN-PACIFIC SCHEME

The Merchants Association will hold a meeting at 3 o'clock this afternoon, at which the proposed Pan-Pacific conference will be discussed. The old question arising from Treasurer Campbell's call for corporation exhibits will also be brought up, and considerable discussion is expected on this latter matter.

The Board of Trustees of the Chamber of Commerce will meet tomorrow afternoon and will also take up the Pan-Pacific matter. It is not probable that the Chamber will concern itself with the corporation exhibits, which question will presumably be left entirely in the hands of the Merchants Association. The question as to whether the Chamber has made itself liable to contribute for the maintenance of the National Guard will be covered by a report, which Secretary Wood will submit.

BIG BLOCK SOLD OF OAHU STOCK

The largest block of Oahu Sugar Co stock sold since the par value of the shares in that concern was changed from \$10.00 to \$20.00 a share, was sold today by Wm. Williamson of the Waterhouse Trust Co., to Harry Armitage. The price paid was \$24 a share.

The block was purchased on an order I received by cable from Europe," said Armitage this afternoon. "It shows that people abroad have not yet lost any confidence in our stocks. The price is about equivalent to \$120 on the old value. Oahu is going to pay a one per cent dividend a month all through this year, and I see no reason why the Oahu shares should not go as high as Ewa, which are now at \$25. It will undoubtedly be easier for the Oahu shares to catch up with Ewa as they are now, than it would have been before when they were \$100 at par."
