

(Continued from Page 4) but the Supervisors of Hawaii have raised their own pay.

IMPORTANT OFFICIALS. Kaleo thought that \$600 a year for the most important officials of the county is too little.

John Hughes said he never knew that the Supervisors worked so hard as some of the members seem to think they do.

The present state of our finances does not warrant boosting up salaries. We as citizens of this country owe something to the country besides going into office for what there is in it.

Kaleo thought the supervisors the most low paid of all officials. The road supervisor and the county engineer, who are paid \$250 a month, are not as important officials as the county supervisors.

Kaleo made a long, windy speech, and was the most ardent of those supporting the salary grab.

Kalana also helped to boost it along. He made a speech as devoid of logic as Kaleo's.

GRAH GOES THROUGH. The grab amendment offered by Kaleo was jammed through by a vote of 12 to 12.

Kaleo moved to reduce the salary of sheriff of Oahu from \$2400 to \$2000. Motion lost. The sheriff of Hawaii was also given \$2400.

The Maui Sheriff was raised from \$2100 to \$2400. Rawlins moved to make the salary of the sheriff of Kauai \$2900 instead of \$2400. The amendment was lost. The figure remains at \$2400.

Kahana moved to amend to pay the County Clerk of Hawaii \$2400 instead of \$2100, as in the bill.

Rawlins moved to amend by making the salary \$1800 instead of \$2100. His amendment was lost. The amendment to raise the salary to \$2400 carried, and the item passed.

The bill called for \$1800 for the county clerk of Maui. Pall moved to amend by making it \$1500. Carried.

Rice moved similar action in case of the county clerk of Kauai. Sheldon opposed, saying the county clerk is the hardest worked man in Kauai.

Pall moved to defer. Carried. The auditor of Oahu was given \$2400 a year; of Hawaii \$2000; of Maui \$2000; of Kauai \$1500.

Nailima wanted the county attorney of Hawaii paid \$3000, although the county attorney of Oahu was given only \$2400. Rawlins thought such action ridiculous. Nailima said the county attorney of Hawaii has to work harder and travel more.

Rawlins said there appeared to be a division among the Hawaii Representatives. Kanilo, he said, had got up when talking for his lava flow road and said the County of Hawaii had no money, but now they are trying to boost the salary of every county official on the island.

Kaleo moved the committee the end report progress. Carried. Speaker Holstein called the House to order. The committee reported and asked to sit again. Report adopted. The committee will resume consideration of the bill this afternoon.

PATTERSON WRITES LETTER ON DAM Before departing for Kauai, Mr. Patterson, of dam fame, placed in the hands of Senator Chillingworth, a letter of some length, treating on the construction of the Nuanani dam in general and his views in particular. The letter has never been read or exhibited at any of the numerous investigation meetings which have been held since its receipt. Why the letter has not been brought forward and treated as evidence no reason is given.

In the matter of Howard Adams vs. the Kaimuki Heights Zoo et al., the defendants have filed their answer, which is a general denial of the allegations of the complaint.

Judge Robinson this morning granted the motion to try the alleged arsonists, Guerre and Ahna, separately. The trial of the former is set for tomorrow morning. Ahna will be tried as soon as the first case is concluded.

In the case of Lee Let, charged with attempting to bribe Chief of Detectives Taylor, a demurrer was interposed this morning by Lee's attorney, but it was overruled by Judge Robinson and a plea of not guilty was then entered.

A penalty of 10 per cent. will be added to all personal taxes remaining unpaid after the 31st day of March, and garnishment proceedings will be immediately instituted to enforce the payment of same.

The usual series of noon-day services for men under the auspices of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew will be held this year at the Y. M. C. A. hall. The services will be from 12:05 to 12:25. A short address will be made by a clergyman or layman from one of the churches.

Alfred Freitas, the boy who has given the police so much trouble, plead guilty before Judge Robinson, to the charge of being present at a gambling game. The two larceny cases were tabled. The Judge suspended sentence for 12 months, to allow the boy to get out of the country and he left for San Francisco this morning on the Alameda.

NEW BILL EXEMPTS LEPELERS FROM TAXES

Among the bills introduced in the Senate recently is the following by Senator Lane: Any person who has been declared by the Territorial Board of Health a leper and detained and confined as such at the leper settlement, County of Kalawao, shall be exempted from the payment of the following, to-wit: Real property, personal property, personal taxes and specific taxes.

This Act shall take effect from and after January 1st, A. D. 1908.
