RAILROADS HAVE DAY IN SENATE

Smith Wants Exemption Extended To All Islands

SENATE. 29th Day—Forenoon Session. Coelho reported for the Health Committee recommending that the petitions for the appointment of government physicians for certain districts be considered together with the appropriation bill. Adopted.

Smith reported for the Judiciary Committee on House Bill 92, relating to private ways and water rights, commencing the subject of the bill, but amending it in some particulars. It also reported on House Bill 113, regarding the use of automobiles in Honolulu, recommending the passage of a substitute bill, as the original one, which placed certain limits on the speed, was considered impracticable.

The Judiciary committee reported verbally that the reasons given by the Governor in his veto of House Bill 15, relating to coroner's inquests, seemed valid.

WANT BILL TABLED. Dowsett reported for the Ways and Means Committee on House Bill 79, relating to certificates of Hawaiian birth, recommending that it be tabled, as its provisions, that printed forms should be supplied applicants for certificates, were considered impracticable.

The report was signed by Dowsett and McCarthy. Coelho did not concur.

The Education Committee reported on Senate Bill 89, relating to private schools, recommending its passage.

Chillingworth reported for the conference committee on Senate Bill 32, increasing the punishment for having intercourse with a female under 14 years, recommending that the House recede from its action in amending the bill, and that it be passed as passed by the Senate. Both Senate and House members had signed the report, which was adopted.

WANTS CHARITY REPORT. Coelho introduced a resolution asking for a statement from the Associated Charities as to what relief work had done during the past year. This organization had asked for relief, and Coelho had been helpless by the sending of their head to the Settlement, and he thought that in making an appropriation an arrangement could be made for the benefit of such cases.

Senate Bill 51, exempting from payment of taxes for five years, such common carrier railroads in Hawaii as may be constructed during the next two years, came up for second reading. Smith moved to make the bill apply to all the islands.

Dowsett advised that care be exercised lest railroads on Oahu, which were now in process of construction, have their property expropriated. He moved to defer action until March 26. Makelaan opposed this, fearing that this might lead to the ultimate pigeon-holing thereof. He represented Hawaii and wanted to see the measure passed.

LIRES UNPAID BILLS. A message was received from the Governor showing the unpaid bills to amount to \$7,937.12.

Coelho called attention to the fact that the bulk of the money had gone to Oahu. He then moved to refer it to the Ways and Means Committee. Carried.

FIGHTS FOR RAILROADS. Makelaan resumed his speech against having the Hawaii railroad bill deferred. He gave the first longwinded oratorical performance of the Senate this session, speaking at tireless length in Hawaiian. He moved the passage of the bill.

Dowsett said he thought it a good thing to exempt the railroads on Hawaii, but Smith's amendment was so far-reaching that a little time for investigation seemed necessary.

Smith said he wanted Maui and Kauai especially included in the bill. This was the reason for his amendment. He favored the postponement of the bill by extending the time specified for the building of such railroads from two to five years. Makelaan withdrew his motion and action was deferred.

Senate Bill 68, relating to school age, and House Bill 120, relating to the registration of copartnerships, both passed third reading.

House Bill 92, relating to private ways and water rights, passed second reading.

House Bill 79, relating to certificates of Hawaiian birth, came up for second reading. The committee report recommended that it be tabled. Coelho and Chillingworth stated that Hawaiian-born Chinese had complained of the great amount of red tape involved in getting the certificates and some method should be adopted which would simplify the matter. The committee report was adopted and the bill tabled. A recess was taken until 2 p. m.
