## TRANSPORT DIX WILL HAVE MANY HORSES

The transport Dix, which is due to leave San Francisco on or about the 10th of this month, will have on board twelve hundred first-class, high-bred horses, valued at \$250,000. The horses are intended for the use of the Ninth Cavalry in the Philippines. This is the largest and most valuable shipment of horses ever sent across the Pacific.

## IMMIGRANTS MAY STILL COME

A cablegram has been received from Ernest G. Walker dated Washington, April 9, stating that the President has written Governor Carter, under date of April 2, that immigrants can be imported after July 1, provided that only individuals subscribe funds.

John Amasu has brought suit for damages in the sum of \$50,000 against Wm. Mahuka for false imprisonment. Amasu is a member of the band. He was arrested, he alleges, on March 26, 1907, on a false charge of attempt to kill the defendant Mahuka. He thinks this indignity entitles him to about \$5000.

## OFFICER IS COMING TO TAKE ROBERT GIBB BACK

Acting British Consul Forster has received two cablegrams in connection with the extradition of Robert Gibb, charged with embezzlement, who was arrested on the Ventura in response to a request from Auckland. The first message is from Auckland and states that the depositions are now being prepared and that an officer will leave for Honolulu on the next boat, taking with him all necessary papers.

The second message is one from the Foreign Office in London and gives the British representative here instructions to go ahead with the matter, all the necessary formalities between the two Governments having been complied with.

The Internal Revenue officials have been on the scent of an okolehau still for some months and this forenoon located the still in Waianae valley. Two men and a quantity of liquor was captured.

Martin Erickson, who has been in the hospital for several weeks suffering from an aggravated case of typhoid, died last Sunday and was buried the following day in the Foreign cemetery. He was a young man who arrived in this country about five years ago and has been in the employ of the Kalaha Sugar Co. since his arrival.—Garden Island.

## STAND BY WILFLEY

## WASHINGTON PAPER SAYS SHANGHAI MAN IS UPHELD

Secretary Taft Goes Out of His Way to Praise His Friend—Where Does Lorrin Andrews Get Off?

The Washington Herald of March 11 says: "President Roosevelt has received several cables from influential citizens in Shanghai, China, testifying to the benefits already accomplished by the new United States Court there. Although the court only began sitting in January, with ex-Attorney General Lebbous R. Wilfley, of the Philippines, as presiding judge, many important reforms are already reported. It is understood that, despite occasional criticisms of the new judiciary as have reached the State Department, the administration indorses Judge Wilfley."

Secretary Taft, when interviewed on the action of the court in debarring certain resident American attorneys from practicing before it, commended the vigorous campaign inaugurated by the new tribunal. While the court, exercising jurisdiction over American residents in Shanghai and other Chinese seaports, was established in accordance with an act of Congress and various treaties with China, and is therefore under direct supervision of the State Department, Judge Wilfley was appointed at the instance of Secretary Taft, with whom he was associated in the Philippines. TAFT PRAISES HIM

"Nobody conversant with the work Judge Wilfley did at Manila and with similar debarred conditions that existed in Shanghai before his advent can question the sincerity of the man," declared Secretary Taft, who continued: "Only his first-class record in the Philippines, added to very strong endorsements from the Federal judiciary in Missouri, prompted his appointment to the Shanghai court, an I criticisms at this time are certainly premature."

Secretary Taft added that conditions in Shanghai were so unique as to demand not only judicial, but courageous action on the part of the presiding court officers. Concerning the action of the Department of Justice in recommending that Attorney Lorrin Andrews, formerly of Brooklyn, and other disbarred lawyers, be restored to the privilege of practice, it is announced that the recommendation will be left entirely to the discretion of the court in China. ANDREWS' EN ROUTE

Attorney Andrews, having personally protested to the State Department on the disbarment action, is now on his way back to Shanghai with the expectation of resuming practice on his arrival. He claims to have been disbarred, it is said, from representing one Price, as counsel, in defending a charge of threatening one Jovansen, of Shanghai, with a revolver. Judge Wilfley refused to admit Price to bail, but word now comes from San Francisco that the Federal Court of Appeals in California has overruled the decision. Papers in the case are due in Shanghai this week. Of eight attorneys, Andrews included, who took the examination, only two passed.

As to whether Judge Wilfley was acting arbitrarily in this connection, Assistant Secretary of State Bacon said that the court was and is entirely within its province in holding examinations and passing upon the moral, as well as mental qualifications of applicants. This right is based, he said, upon a United States Supreme Court ruling of long standing.

## "BLACK LEG" GAMBLERS

An interesting phase of the controversy was presented yesterday by Representative Denby, of the Committee on Foreign Affairs, on whose recommendation the court was established. He explained that prior to the arrival of Judge Wilfley in Shanghai, a stigma was attached to the name of the American girl, simply because of a few characters representing themselves as American. His prompt and vigorous steps toward remedying this has effectually removed the stigma and has incidentally resulted in driving a "black-leg" gambling element from Shanghai. Following arrests in nearly a dozen cases and the imposition of heavy fines this evil has been all but obliterated. Representative Denby is informed, at least in so far as reflections upon American standards of morality are concerned. At the next session of Congress, such amendments as may be found necessary will be made in the bill under which the court exists. Until then, the authority of the presiding judge is absolute, and he will be fully sustained, Representative Denby is assured, by the administration.
