**LICENSE BILL IS
FINALLY PASSED**

SENATE

17th Day--Afternoon Session
The Chair appointed Chillingworth, Brown, Hayselden, McCarthy and Gandall as a Conference Committee on House Bill 135, the general license bill.

The House returned Senate Bill 79, making additional appropriations for the Public Works Department and the Bureau of Agriculture, with a minor amendment, in which the Senate concurred.

KALAMA SCENTS A RAT

House Bill 204, to encourage water systems for the sale of water, came up from the House. Kalama moved to reject the bill. He explained that it exempted ditches from the payment of taxes. He did not know whether the bill came from the Hawaiian Commercial or the Hamakua Ditch Co.

Chillingworth said Kalama was misrepresenting facts.

Kalama's motion failed and the bill passed first reading.

HOUSE BILLS PASS

House Bill 203, establishing the rights of hotel keepers in respect to the baggage of guests; House Bill 202, relating to the holding of corporate stock by banking corporations; House Bill 179, regulating the expenditure of public moneys; House Bill 194, providing a sinking fund for the redemption or purchase of Territorial bonds; House Bill 208, relating to licenses; House Bill 205, to protect the public from animals.

FAVORS LIBRARY BILL

The Miscellaneous Committee reported on House Bill 184, making the minimum wage for laborers engaged on public works \$1.25 a day, recommending its passage. The same committee reported on House Bill 135, the library bill, recommending its passage. It also reported on the petition for a wireless station at Kalaupapa, recommending that it be tabled, as the appropriation bill was already out of the hands of the Senate.

Woods moved to reconsider the vote on the report of the Conference Committee on the license bill, which was tabled this morning because it would license fishing boats over 30 inches beam, and knock out the bill-board license.

JAPANESE FIND CHAMPION
Chillingworth said the fishing boat license was directed against Japanese boats and was therefore unfair. The sampans were already paying \$24 a year for the mooring privilege in Honolulu harbor. He claimed that Senators had bragged that the bill got at the Japs. Makekau, he said, had actually roared in his efforts to knock out the license.

Makekau explained that he did not want to endanger the bill by making stubborn resistance to one single item thereof.

Smith said the bill should go to conference. He did not see any reason why fishing should be licensed more than taro-growing. Fishing, as it was being carried on, was a public benefit, as fish was now cheaper than formerly.

FISHING IS A TRUST

Dowsett said there was no greater trust than the fishing business. Between Kahuku and Honolulu no fish could be had because all the fish was sent to Honolulu, where fixed prices were maintained. The report was finally adopted.

The Ways and Means Committee's report on House Bill 161, providing for the payment of claims against the Territory, incurred before June 30, 1905, was adopted. This cuts out the item to reimburse the Pioneer Mill Co. for money advanced during the Lahaina riot.

Knuudsen moved to reimburse Jared Smith in the sum of \$1,873.86, which he advanced to complete the library building at the Experiment Station.

The bill passed second reading and was placed on the special order of the day for Thursday at 2 p. m.

Kalama moved to raise House Bill 79 from the table. It relates to the issuance of certificates of Hawaiian birth, and passed second reading.

**JAPANESE COOLIES
WELCOME TO CHILE**

Honolulu is not the only port which is getting a large share of Japanese immigration, according to a statement made this morning by Capt. Filmer, of the Kasato Maru. In speaking of this he said:

"There are from 7,000 to 10,000 Japanese going to Chile each year. My ship takes about 900 a trip and we make about three voyages a year, and the other vessels which go there from Japan take three or four times as many more. The Japanese are gradually replacing the Chinese and work on rubber plantations or any other kind of labor which they can get. The Chinese are going into business, running little stores and so on and are doing very well."

"The Japanese government makes restrictions in regard to the number of emigrants who can be taken away, but on the other end there is no trouble. There is no inspection or deportation such as there is here. They welcome all the Japanese who come there and the more they get the better they like it."

"The reason that I have put in here is to get coal. The charge in Chile is \$17 per ton and you can see that at that rate there is not much of an object in buying coal at that port. Here it is high enough but not as bad as that."

LADIES ARE ALL GOING

How often is it that people are given the chance to see girls in aquatic sports? It is certain that there are not many places outside of Hawaii where this is the case.
