LIQUOR BILL NOW UP TO GOVERNOR

Senate Adopts Report Of Conference Committee

INSURANCE BILL IS ROASTED BY SENATE

SAYS MEASURE IS INIQUITOUS AND TENDS TO CREATE THE FORMATION OF A TRUST

SENATE.

59th Day—Forenoon Session. The Senate had a busy day today, although action on several important matters such as a bunch of vetoes, the teachers' pension bill, and the Governor's appointments, which are up for confirmation, was deferred. However, the veto of the new election law was overridden, and the conference committee report on the liquor bill adopted. This included the passage of all the important amendments made to the measure by the House, and it is now up to the Governor.

An interesting feature of the session was a lively debate on the insurance law, which Smith denounced as tending to create a trust and being iniquitous, and which was warmly defended by Dowsett.

TEACHERS' PENSION BILL.

The Judiciary Committee reported verbally on the teachers' pension bill, returning it with the recommendation that it be taken up in Committee of the Whole. The Superintendent of Public Instruction had offered some amendments which might meet the objections made to the measure. Knudsen moved that the matter be made a special order for 2 p. m. when Superintendent Hobbitt could appear. This amendment was lost and the matter set in its regular order.

LIQUOR BILL PASSED.

Cochio moved to adopt the report of the conference committee on Senate Bill 91, the liquor bill. This carried, only Woods and Makela voting against it.

LAND COMMISSIONER OPENS MORE LANDS

Hakalau Association Takes Kaiwike III. Tract

Land Commissioner Pratt this morning received from the Oseria association, one of the Hakalau land associations, an agreement to take the lots on the Hanalei side of the Kaiwike III tract, and within half an hour he had sent a wireless to one of the Hilo papers to advertise the lots to be opened for the application of the members of the association on June 30.

There are 17 members of the association, and they will take a corresponding number of the lots, which are good cane land and contain from 20 to 40 acres each. The entire tract contains 55 lots, thus leaving 38 for general settlement. These 38 lots will be opened up within a short time.

The Commissioner has issued the leases to the Open-Pelean association, another one of the Hakalau associations, and they should be in the hands of the members today.

This, with the opening up of the Kaiwike III tract, cleans up all the troubles of the Department in the Hilo district.

The Alewa tract is still tied up by lack of a road to allow of getting on the land. The road has been mapped (Continued on Page 3)
