### BARNEY DID IT AGAIN

San Francisco had all the luck in the ball game with the Angels at Freeman's Park yesterday afternoon, and that accounts for the long end of a 7-to-5 score, says the Chronicle of September 4. "Hen" Berry's men were a little travel worn, and they didn't take advantages when they would have counted most. Barney Joy did the string for the Seals and just poked out in front.

Dillon set his human ice wagon. Hosp, to work, and he was just as slow as usual, which made the contest drag on for many more minutes than it should have done. He was touched up, too, and one of the bingles was good for the entire circuit.

The run-getting started in the first inning, when San Francisco chased four over the plate. Hildebrand laced out one that gave him a bag, and he moved up one when Spencer was passed. Wheeler sent them along another station on a sacrifice, and Charles Irwin drove the two home with a single. He went to second when Melchior hit to third, and when Nick Williams started to pull off the double steal after being hit with the ball, the two men tallied on the awful heavy "trash" made of Eager's throw to intercept Irwin of third.

The score stood this way until the opening of the fourth, when Barney blew up after two men had been down. Cravath walked and Brasher and Jellis hit for singles, filling the bags. Bert Delmas broke into the hit column with a wallop for three, clearing the bases, and he tagged the plate on a noot throw by Wheeler of Spencer's return of the ball. The bell rang again in the sixth for the Seals, when Wheeler walked, went to second and laced on an out and a single and home on a safety by Williams. Their last two came in the eighth when Joy was passed, went to second on a sacrifice and scored with Wheeler when he hit one to center that netted him a four-bagger.
