HONOLULU JAPANESE WEAKEN ISHII'S CASE.

Ottawa, Sept. 16.—Sir Wilfred Laurier and Commissioner Ishii conferred today over the Japanese situation on the Pacific coast and the question of Japanese immigration into Canada. Commissioner Ishii admitted that the spirit of the agreement entered into with Canada by Japan for the restriction of the emigration of laborers to Canada to a small number a year had been violated by the arrival of so many Japanese laborers from Honolulu. While making this admission he stated that any amendment of the treaty between Great Britain and Japan, to which Canada is a consenting party, to put a stop to the Japanese immigration from Hawaii would be difficult to secure.

ROGERS EXCUSED ON ACCOUNT OF ILLNESS.

Boston, Sept. 16.—The court has refused to compel the attendance of H. H. Rogers to testify in the case brought against the Standard Oil Company by Raymond in which fifty millions are involved. Rogers is ill and is excused on that account.

SOLDIERS WILL REMAIN.

Cast blanca, Sept. 16.—Following the conclusion of the treaty of peace between the allied forces and the Moorish insurgents the French and Spanish troops now in Morocco will be distributed among the seaports for the purpose of policing the country.

FEDERAL PHYSICIANS WILL ASSIST BLUE.

San Francisco, Sept. 16.—Four Federal physicians have received orders to assist Blue in handling his work in connection with the plague outbreak here.

NEW COLOMBIA RAILROAD.

Bogota, Colombia, Sept. 16.—The new railroad built along the Magdalena river was formally opened today. The line connects this city with the Caribbean coast and cheapens the cost of coast freight.

ELACK HUNDREDS MURDER JEWS.

Odesa, Russia, Sept. 16.—The Black Hundreds are pillaging again in the Jewish quarters of the city. Two Jews, who resisted the pillagers, were killed.

TROOPS MUST BE VACCINATED.

San Juan, Sept. 16.—An order has been issued that vaccination of the United States troops as a preventative against yellow fever is to be compulsory.

PREPARATIONS FOR NAVAL RECEPTION

Warships And Dock Will Appear In Great Splendor

A splendid naval reception and dance will be given on board the flagship West Virginia, the cruiser Pennsylvania and on the naval dock tonight. Everybody is busy decorating the warships and the dock, and when completed they will present very attractive and beautiful appearance. The sailors are erecting stands and booths on the dock and the electricians from West Virginia and Pennsylvania are connecting wires between the two ships. The searchlights are being made ready and every available light will be burning tonight. There will be about 5500 lights lit besides the searchlights. All the masts and yards will be attractively illuminated with colored lights. Large American flags will be placed in conspicuous places and the rays from the searchlights will be thrown at them. The cruiser decks are decorated with national and naval colors, while the stands and booths on the dock are covered with palms, leaves and other mountain greens. Everything is managed by the officers and sailors, and none of the shore people were present to offer their suggestions to the naval boys. On the fore mast of the flagship is written the words West Virginia and "Maryland is worded on the foremast of the cruiser which bears that name. These two names will be shown with electric lights and will make the shore people wonder at the splendor and brilliancy of the American navy. The affair is by invitation but that does not prevent the general public from seeing everything. The old fish market will be crowded by those who can not go beyond the naval gate. The bands from the two cruisers will furnish the music for the dance and refreshments will be served during the reception. As the guests go in at the gate they will notice an artificial garden which is prettily and artistically made by the sailors.

MACDONALD WAS LOWEST BIDDER

Bids for the construction of the Walluku court house were opened at the office of the department of Public Works yesterday. Only two tenders were submitted. The Concrete Construction Company offered to erect the building within 200 days for \$31,150. This bid is out of the question, as the appropriation made by the Legislature for the new court house is only \$25,000. A. P. MacDonald's tender was \$23,312.50, and his bid being within the appropriation and the lowest one submitted, the contract will go to him. He agrees to have the building completed within 120 days from the time the contract is awarded.

FUMIGATED POTATOES

T. H. Petrie of Castle & Cooke, agents for Matson liner Hilonian, states that the agents of the vessel do not accept the verdict of certain experts to the effect that the potatoes on the Hilonian were not damaged by fumigation. Mr. Petrie says the specialists may have got hold of some potatoes suffering from dry rot, but the fumigation was what did the major portion of the damage in his estimation.
