"AIR FULL OF POLICE BLEEDING CITIZENS"

Characteristic Argument

There are more police in Honolulu than in many large cities in the Union. They have mounted police, foot police, spies, detectives, patrolmen. The air is full of police bleeding the taxpayers.

The above somewhat mixed metaphor was perpetrated by George A. Davis this morning during the course of his argument before Judge Dole in the habeas corpus matter of John Marks.

Marks is the man who was recently convicted before Judge Lindsay of stealing a horse, and was sentenced to five years in jail. Davis came to the rescue and got out a writ of habeas corpus, the effect of which was to transfer Marks from the custody of the High Sheriff to that of the United States Marshal. It made no change in his place of abode, however, for the Marshal turned him over again to the High Sheriff for safekeeping, and he is still in Onahu jail.

Yesterday Marks was taken out and brought into Lindsay's court, to be tried on a second charge, that of cattle-stealing. Davis, his attorney, objected to the proceedings on the ground that the prisoner was in the custody of the United States Marshal and the Territory had no jurisdiction over him. The point raised presented difficulties which Lindsay referred to the United States Judge. Then the Attorney General's department came into Dole's court and obtained an order modifying the original order of commitment, so as to permit of Marks being taken into the Circuit Court for trial.

This morning Davis appeared be-

fore Judge Dole and moved to vacate the modifying order.

Davis stated in his usual gentle tones that there was to be no display of fireworks. And then he commenced his argument in his own peculiar style. He waved aloft the flag and fluttered the leaves of the Constitution and all the treaties on habeas corpus, to prove to the Judge that no man could be in the custody of two officials at the same time, and that if Marks were in the custody of the Marshal, the Territorial officials could not touch him.

The right of habeas corpus, he vigorously contended, stood for liberty. It was paramount to all other laws and could not be superseded. He only wanted to obtain for his client the rights guaranteed to him by the law and Constitution of the United States.

The Territory was represented by Attorney General Hemenway, County Attorney Cathcart, and M. F.

Prosser, and Davis referred often and with biting humility and bowed head to "the numerous able and learned counsel for the Territory."

When Davis got through, Cathcart arose, and in a calm, conversational manner, began his argument. He held that the Judge, in granting the temporary writ of habeas corpus, had the right to commit the prisoner to the custody of whom he pleased. If he committed him to the custody of the Marshal, and the latter decided to allow him to be brought into the Circuit Court for trial, only the Marshal was responsible, and he could not see that justice was being in any manner defeated.

Judge Dole sided with Cathcart, and denied Davis' motion to vacate the modifying order.

Davis accepted and protested. "Suppose," he said, "the prisoner John Marks, when brought into Judge Lindsay's court, should begin to shout at the top of his voice and should keep

on shouting so, so that the trial could not proceed. What could the Judge do. Could he commit him to jail for contempt? He is already in jail and in the custody of the Marshal, and the Territorial Judge has no authority to take him out of that custody."

Judge Dole agreed that it would hardly be possible for the Circuit Judge to commit the prisoner for contempt.

Then Cathcart arose. "Your Honor will see," he said, "that shouting is not against the rules of the Court and does not constitute contempt." And he sat down, while the Court and those present smiled broadly.

The matter was immediately transferred to Judge Lindsay's court for trial.
