Rosen's Delay Starts Rumors

DEPARTURE OF AMBASSADOR BRYCE ALSO CAUSES COMMENT AND WAR TALK

Washington, D. C., Jan. 29.—The departure of Ambassador Bryce for England is looked on here as an indication that he is to submit to his Government the question of the position it will take if hostilities open between Japan and America. Baron Rosen, the Russian Ambassador, was about to leave to join his family in Russia but it is learned on good authority that he has been ordered to stay here. The alarmists see in this an indication of war, while the conservatives consider it reassuring, or at least nothing to be alarmed at.

Precautions are being taken in the way of strengthening the fortifications in the Philippines, Hawaii and on the Pacific Coast, and other precautions are declared by the Administration to be merely acts of prudence, although they serve the purpose of those who insist that there must be trouble. By these it is insisted that Japan has a war chest of \$750,000,000, although that country is constantly parading its alleged poverty. No announcement is forthcoming regarding the negotiations with Japan. The Department of Commerce and Labor is busy scrutinizing the regulations proposed by that country for governing emigration to this country. The State Department continues to issue most reassuring statements as to negotiations and apparently there is the best of feeling in official circles on both sides, but the President and Congress are not likely to neglect all proper and reasonable precautions.

CURE FINANCIAL ILLS

Washington, D. C., Jan. 19.—After two sessions of the Senate Committee on Finance today the members of the committee were in possession of a fair idea of what shape the Aldrich financial bill will be in when it is reported.

It is said to be practically certain that the limit of extra currency which the bill provides for will be raised from \$250,000,000 to \$500,000,000. Most of the members of the committee believe that this figure is not too high for a time of emergency when a heavy issue of currency notes is demanded on security of the prescribed sort, and under the prescribed tax. The tax on the emergency issues will not, it is believed, be placed higher than 6 per cent, which the bill now provides. An amendment offered by Senator Bailey reducing the required population of a county or municipality whose bonds are to figure in a currency issue from 20,000 to 10,000 is expected to receive the support of a majority of the committee, and according to reliable report, will be adopted.

Senator Dolliver probably will offer an amendment in opposition to the railroad bond feature of the bill. Senator Bailey will no doubt support him in such a project.

NO POLITICS FOR ADE

La Porte, Ind., Jan. 15.—George Ade, humorist and playwright, who recently announced himself as a candidate for delegate from the Tenth Indiana District to the Republican National Convention in Chicago, yesterday announced his withdrawal. Ade gives as the reason for his action that he has no time for politics.

West Wants Its Bank Law

LINING UP TO OPPOSE ALDRICH MEASURE—WILL STATE THEIR NEEDS

Chicago, Ill., Jan. 19.—A currency measure that will in many respects represent the sentiment of bankers west of the Alleghenies probably will be framed within the next month and sent to Washington. While no one connected with the currency commission of the American Bankers' Association has said so, there is an undercurrent of belief that this body of bankers which will meet here tomorrow will help such a plan along.

The head of the commission, A. H. Hepburn, president of the Chase National Bank of New York, is not to be present, having sailed for Europe yesterday. With Hepburn absent the East will have one representative in the person of W. V. Cox of Washington.

Most of the others are from Western cities, such as Chicago, Indianapolis, St. Louis, Cleveland, Pittsburg, Omaha, Des Moines, and Kansas City.

The South will be represented by delegates from New Orleans and Atlanta. They, however, are expected to agree with the other members from the Mississippi Valley country that the Aldrich bill is not what the West and South wants.

"I do not know just what will be done," said James B. Forgan, president of the First National Bank, and a member of the commission. "I know, however, that the members of the body are not in favor of the Aldrich measure. Whether a new bill will be recommended through the commission's efforts remains to be seen."

In banking and financial circles, however, it was taken for granted that the meeting of the bankers at this time could be for no other reason.

IN COMMEMORATION OF M'KINLEY

The At Home tomorrow afternoon of the City Improvement Circle of the Kiohaha Art League promises to be one of the finest affairs of its kind ever given in Honolulu. The decoration committee has been at work for several days. The building is so fine a structure that it lends itself to being dressed in holiday garb most readily. Five hundred palm leaves from Alahua were sent in by Governor Clegg. Hundreds of flags are being strung in the rafters. The large platform with a set of stairs at either side will provide ample space for all of those on the program. From the marshal's office an oil-painting of Wm. McKinley in heroic size is being sent.

Mr. McKinley's favorite flower was the red carnation. On the anniversary of his birthday the custom of wearing a carnation in the buttonhole to commemorate our martyred President is quite universal in the East, and is a good custom to be followed here in Hawaii.
