Political Shots In House

UNCLE JOE CANNON IS RUN AGAINST BRYAN IN SOME SPEECH-MAKING

Washington, D. C., Jan. 21.—During the debate in the House today on the revision of the penal code, Mr. Payne of New York said some Missouri members were making attacks on the bill fearing it they didn't do something Missouri would say permanently in the Republican column.

Champ Clark of Missouri replied. He explained that at the last election 75,000 Democrats in Missouri stayed home "because they did not like a certain telegram sent from Kansas to the St. Louis convention. Those Democrats were not dead."

"They have not moved away," he said, "and they did not join the Republican party, because Roosevelt only got 7,000 votes more than McKinley in 1904."

The next moment, he threw the House into an uproar when he declared that "on the eighth of July next, we intend to nominate William J. Bryan for President."

Continuing, Mr. Clark challenged the Republicans to name their man. "I will hit my head on the proposition," he said, "that there are not ten men on that side that will dare stand up and say who their candidate will be."

"I can tell you who the gentleman from Illinois is for," interjected Mr. Boutwell of Illinois, who took up the challenge.

"You are for Uncle Joe Cannon," suggested Mr. Clark.

"I am for him," replied Mr. Boutwell amid Republican applause. "You may nominate your Bryan in July, but we will elect Cannon in November."

Some amusement was created when Mr. Clark inquired of Mr. Boutwell if he was certain "that the Administration forces would be for Uncle Joe or not."

"Every Republican in the United States will be," said Mr. Boutwell.

"Ah, don't you believe any such stuff as that," said Mr. Clark, whose remark called for more demonstrative applause, which broke out again when Mr. Clark inquired of Mr. Boutwell, "Were you at the kitchen dinner here when Roosevelt and Foraker had that fight?"

"That," replied Boutwell, "was simply one of those little exhibitions of spirit that will be entirely forgotten and every Republican in the country will vote for the Republican nominee."

"One time fisherman," remarked Mr. Clark, with a sigh, as he took his seat amid shouts of laughter from the Democratic side.

Postoffices And Taft

PRESIDENT WILL KEEP ON NAMING MEN WHO WILL HELP TAFT

If Senators Foraker and Dick of Ohio have an idea that they can stop the President appointing postmasters in Ohio by getting the Senate to reject the appointments, and thus hurt the Taft boom, they are radically wrong, writes the Washington correspondent of the New York Evening Telegram. The President, it was said today by persons close to the White House, has another idea.

The Senators from Ohio protested against the alleged distribution of postoffices in the interest of the Taft boom. In one case it was charged that a man was nominated for a postoffice, but the Postoffice Department declined to accept him on the ground that the incumbent was a good official and there was no reason to turn him out.

At that time the man nominated was chairman of his County committee and was anti-Taft. The story goes that he "dipped" later, became a Taft man, got the committee to inaugurate Taft, and was then duly nominated and recommended by the President. He was among the batch turned down by the Senate.

At any rate, the narrative in political circles represents that the President will go right on naming men for postoffices and the Senators may turn them down.

Every time one is rejected, it is calculated, the Foraker forces will make one new enemy with a determination to impress his feelings on the man who deprived him of the job. It isn't just clear where the Taft movement is going to lose much by the arrangement.
