A Chinese grocery-wagon horse got scared by a watering cart at Moillili yesterday morning and the vehicle and driver were precipitated over an embankment seven or eight feet high. The wagon was turned completely over and the shafts broken, but, strangely, neither driver nor horse was injured. A decision of the Supreme Court was handed down yesterday in the appealed case of the Honolulu Rapid Transit and Land Company from a decision of the Tax Appeal Court of Oahu disallowing a deduction of \$23,244 for loss from wear and tear in use, claimed as a proper deduction from gross income in 1906. The Elfelders, headed by Frank Cooley and Miss Kingsbury, will leave for Hilo on Tuesday and will make the trip to the volcano. On the return to Honolulu they will stop at Maui and ascend Haleakala, before giving performances in Waikuku. While in Hilo they will present their best attractions at Spreckels Hall. The divorce proceedings brought in Judge Lindsay's court by Maraea Aki Kanoho against her husband, Joseph Kanoho, and the counter suit brought by the husband against the wife, each charging the other with adultery, were dismissed because proved. PURSER JAS. L. FRIEL reports the following freight brought over on the Mauna Loa: 7650 bags A sugar, 830 bags coffee, 16 beans, 9 taro, 16 ginger, 1 awa, 19 bones, 115 bunches bananas, 18 barrels oranges, 8 cases and sundries, 30 head cattle, 3 calves, 10 hogs and 1 goat. Purser Friel reports the following sugar on the other islands: Honoupa, 5888; Punahou, 159; Honolulu, 1000; Paunahou, 1000; Pauilo, 8700; Kukui, 2500. The str. Like-like is at Kukuihaele discharging. THE CLAUDINE IS DUE to sail tonight at 5 o'clock for Lahaina, Kahului, and Hilo ports. She will carry the usual amount of freight and passengers.

THE DECK PLANS of the new flagship Mauna Kea of the Inter-Island fleet are now on exhibition at the company's office. They show the boat to be undoubtedly the finest craft of her kind that has ever been in Honolulu harbor. In fact, the officials of the Union Iron Works, where the boat was built, in San Francisco, say that there is not another boat in the United States that equals her in the splendor of equipment and furnishings. Her sleeping rooms are large and roomy, and there are 51 of them. There is a commodious smoking room for the men, with three tables and a settee. The dining-room extends clear across the boat from side to side, and will seat 76 people. Besides this there is an officers' mess room. The toilets are very conveniently situated and are finished in marble and tile. All of the inside fittings are of polished hardwood. The engines of the Mauna Kea are 2200 horsepower, and she can make 16 knots an hour easily. For the first month or so the company expects to run the Mauna Kea on a weekly schedule—that is, she will make one trip a week. Later on, if the volume of business justifies the change, she will make two trips a week to the other islands. The
