son's argument took up the greater part of the morning, and the jury was excused at 11 o'clock. He first gave his petition and the reasons of which it was asked and afterwards, took up the argument, which consisted in main of technicalities.

When Thompson concluded, shortly before noon, Larnach asked the Court whether further argument was wanted. The Judge replied that it was not, for he would deny the motion, and would so inform the jury this afternoon.

Frank Thompson, attorney for Lee Let, first asked the Court to instruct and direct the empaneled jury to return a verdict of not guilty of the crime charged in the indictment. He cited fifteen reasons to support his request, stating first that it was not shown in the proofs offered in support of the indictment that A. P. Taylor was, at the time of his alleged receiving of \$50 from Lee Let, not an executive officer of the County of Oahu.

Thompson then went ahead, attempting to show in the first place that Taylor was not proven a regular police officer at the time of the alleged bribery. He also brought in numerous authorities in an attempt to show that Taylor solicited the bribe. He shows how Taylor and Ayres go "to be bribed," but Lee Let wouldn't come through; so at the third visit Taylor asks him for a guarantee, and when Lee Let handed

out \$50 Taylor said, "We will consider this a part of one day's pay," which Thompson claimed was bribing himself; that Taylor, instead of keeping down crime had encouraged it by suggesting that Lee Let pay him money.

Thompson had, as authority, a similar case in the State of Illinois, in which his contention was borne out. At 11 o'clock the jury was excused until 2 o'clock this afternoon.

Thompson advanced other reasons in support of his request that the jury be instructed to bring in a verdict of not guilty, but they were mostly based on technicalities, and were minor to the ones above given. The jury was excused while the attorneys argued concerning the request.

CHINA WITH AMMUNITION. The P. M. S. S. China, Friele, arrived in port early this morning, from San Francisco, bound for the Orient. She has on board nine hundred and thirty-two thousand cases of ammunition, for Manila. She has altogether about 1500 tons of cargo for the Government, which represents about half of her total cargo. She brings a large mail for this port, 300 bags. She also brings about 50 tons of freight as well as 10 first class passengers. The China has very few people on board this trip. An unusually small number is in the first cabin, and only about 50 in the steerage. A. L. C. Atkinson, who is now chairman of the Sports Committee for Fleet entertainment, said this morning that he is going to call a meeting of all the chairmen of the various sub-committees under him as soon as he can find out who they are. Among other inquiries for seamen from various parts of the world, Shipping Commissioner Almy today received inquiry as to the whereabouts of John J. Craig, who left Baltimore on some date in last December, on one of the Sewell boats. Mr. Almy was enabled to reply that the man left this port recently on the John Eua, bound for Delaware Breakwater, around the Horn.

Republican Platform For Mail Subsidies

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 7.—The Republican platform for Chicago has now been completely drafted with the exception of some of the minor features. The endorsement of the Roosevelt policies is the central idea of the document. The achievements of the party are lauded. The management of the difficult problems in the Philippines, and of the delicate situation in Cuba, is extolled. The admission of Arizona and New Mexico as States is recommended. The platform declares for the exclusion of Asiatic coolies, and for fostering trade with the Orient. It advocates the subsidy of ocean mail steamship lines to Australia and South America.

Garfield In San Francisco

SAN FRANCISCO, Calif., June 7.—Secretary of the Interior Garfield arrived here today en route to Hawaii on the battleship Maine. The Maine and the Alabama will sail on Monday on their voyage to Asiatic waters, touching at Honolulu.

FLOODS AND TORNADES SPREAD WIDE DISASTER BUTTE, Mont., June 6. — After thirty-three days of rain the sun has come out. It will take weeks to rebuild the tracks and resume traffic. Five people were drowned at Great Falls.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., June 7. — Floods in the Missouri and the Kaw rivers have driven 400 people from their homes.

CHARLES CITY, Iowa, June 7.—A tornado passed through this section, destroying 200 houses. It is already known that there is one dead and four missing.

OMAHA, Neb., June 6.—A tornado in southeastern Nebraska has destroyed several towns and numerous lives. GENEVA, Neb., June 6.—A tornado which passed through here left six dead and four fatally injured. INDEPENDENCE, Kas., June 6. The Oklahoma rivers rose ten feet in a few hours today. DEATHS FROM BUBONIC LA GUAYRA, Venezuela, June 7. There have been eighteen deaths here from bubonic plague.
