

KAALAS WIN IN THE NINTH ROUND

Large Crowd At Aala Park—C.A.C. Trims Japanese

The ninth was exciting. Kupa was the first man up and he got to the initial sack on Ayau's poor throw from short. Chillingworth retired, from pitcher to first, advancing Kupa to second. Hoopil reached first on an error. Makaanul fanned, but Kupa scored on the play. Freitas flew to short.

In the Alohas' half Brito singled to center, but the next three batters died one, two, and three.

The Japanese had all the luck against them in the second game. Jack Flores and Michi, two of the best players in the Nippon nine, were laid up and substitutes were put in the game. After making a hard fight, the Chinese lads defeated them by the score of 11 to 3. This will probably lose all their chances for championship honors.

Ross took Flores' place in the box, but the Chinese batters found him too generally and hit his balls wherever they pleased. Akina pitched a good game for the Chinese.
