WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 27.—President Roosevelt has replied to Bryan's charges that he has shown insincerity in his trust-busting program, defending his own administration and renewing his charges against Governor Haskell of Oklahoma.

**SAYS ROOSEVELT IS FOUR-FLUSHER**

GUTHRIE, Okla., Sept. 27.—Governor Haskell has made a reply to the charges made against him by the President. He denounces Roosevelt as a four-flusher.

**RIDDER IS DEMOCRATIC TREASURER**

NEW YORK, N. Y., Sept. 26.—Herman Ridder has been selected as treasurer of the Democratic National Committee in place of Governor Haskell of Oklahoma, who was forced to resign because of the charge made against him by President Roosevelt.

Herman Ridder is the manager of the New York Staats-Zeitung. He was opposed to the nomination of Bryan, but promised to support him if the nomination was given him.

**CHOLERA SHIP IN SAN FRANCISCO**

SAN FRANCISCO, Calif., Sept. 26.—The steamer Seminole has been put into quarantine here, having arrived today from Shanghai. During the voyage two cases of cholera occurred among her passengers, one of the cases proving fatal.

**LOCAL OPTION FOR INDIANA**

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Sept. 26.—The Indiana State Legislature has passed a bill providing for local option.

**TEST OREGON SUNDAY LAW**

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 27.—Fifty storekeepers were arrested in this city today in an effort to put into force a hitherto unused Sunday-closing law. The arrests were made in order that the law may be tested in the courts.

**ATLANTIC FLEET IS NEARING MANILA**

MANILA, P. I., Sept. 27.—Wireless communication with the Atlantic Fleet has been established by the station at Zamboanga, on the island of Mindanao. The reports state that the auxiliary ship Panther has passed the Strait of Basilan, and that the Fleet will arrive here on Wednesday.

**BRITISH SHIP IS LOST**

LAUNCESTON, Tasmania, Sept. 27.—The British ship Loch Finlas, commanded by Captain Dean, has been wrecked on the Tasmanian coast. Twenty of her crew were drowned.

**PROGRESS OF CHOLERA**

ST. PETERSBURG, Russia, Sept. 27.—Although the number of cases of cholera breaking out here and the death list are appalling, yet the totals are smaller, and the authorities believe that the disease is abating. Today the number of cases found was 268, while deaths due to cholera are reported to be 143.

**MANILA, P. I., Sept. 27.—The cholera epidemic continues here. Today there were fourteen new cases reported, with three deaths.**

**THE LIVERPOOL** Board of Trade has made representations to the British Foreign Office for a government steamer to be sent to search for any survivors of the crews of the missing ships Falklandbank and Carnedd Llewyn in the vicinity of Cape Horn and the Island of Tierra del Fuego, in compliance with these requests the Foreign Office has cabled to the Minister at Buenos Ayres authorizing him to make the necessary arrangements for sending a government steamer to explore the whole length of the coast, particularly around the Island of Tierra del Fuego. The British Minister has also been requested to make representations to the Chilean Government authorities with a view to the latter helping in the search for the men. Incidentally, a close lookout will be kept for news of the Arthur Sewall, Bangalore and Adolph Oborg.—S. F. Commercial News.
