ties of family, friendship and propriety here; I have neither the hope nor the desire of any other home.
If honored by your support, for the office to which I aspire, I will give the best that is in me, and my undivided time and attention, to the discharge of its important duties; more than that, I will conduct the office in a thoroughly economical manner, not as an eodeminary institution for personal friends, nor as a retreat for political hacks.
The foxes of the ground have holes the birds of the air have nests, and surely the sons of men who seek to fill public stations should have where to lay their heads—should have some home in the community whose confidence they invite and whose money they would spend. Long Violated Pledge
Chairman Judd of the Republican County Committee this morning expressed considerable surprise at the fact that Long had decided to run independently, and quoted the rule of the party under which Long as a delegate to the Republican convention had pledged himself to support the party and to abide by the action of the convention.

Atkinson Quite Ill
Judd stated this morning that he had visited Chairman Atkinson of the Republican Central Committee. He had found that he was quite ill, and he would probably not be able to be about for another week. As Atkinson was to have active charge of the campaign, his illness leaves a gap, but Judd will step in and fill this during his illness.

Feds Not Behind Long
It was currently reported this morning that the Civic Federation was responsible for the independent candidacy of Carlos Long, but this was emphatically denied by W. R. Castle, who is one of the most prominent active members of the Inner Circle of the Federationists.
"That is absolutely rotten," said Castle when the report was mentioned to him this morning. "Neither I nor the Civic Federation has had anything to do with the matter. Personally, I was much surprised to see him run as an independent candidate, as I always considered him a very strong party man."
"Are you going to endorse him?" asked the reporter.
"I could not say at all at this time," said Castle.

Will Endorse Trent
"Will you endorse Laukeas?" was the next question.
"The Federation will hold its next meeting next week," continued Castle. "I can say that it will be its policy to endorse the candidates who have held office, and who have filled it satisfactorily, on the principle of servants are not discharged when they have done good work, even if as good servants can be secured. Thus in the matter of the office of Treasurer we shall endorse Trent, although we all are friends of von Holt, and know that he would make just as good a Treasurer as Trent. However, we feel that Trent has filled the office well, and that he should be allowed to continue to hold it."

"I have been asked to run by so many people that I decided to do so," said Sheriff Laukeas this morning, "and it is now up to the people to say whether they want to have a police force which is kept out of politics, as is the case at present, or whether they want it made a political machine."
"One point in my favor is the fact that I have a white man as a running mate, namely Mr. Monsarrat, who is running as an independent Republican, while it seems that none of the other candidates for Sheriff have cared to have a white man run with them."

Combination Ticket
J. M. Poeppoe has authorized the publication of the following independent ticket, which includes Home Rulers, Laborites, Democrats, and Republicans.
The ticket was prepared subsequent to the announcement of Carlos Long and Sheriff Laukeas to the effect that they would run respectively for County Attorney and Sheriff on independent tickets.

It is expected that the Home Rulers and Laborites, who meet tomorrow and tomorrow night, will pass upon the qualifications of various candidates before they will endorse them.

Party Men Endorsed
"Yes, sir; I would accept the nomination for Mayor if offered me," said Aehl today. "I am not particularly anxious, but if my friends want me to run for it I will do so."
John Wise, C. J. Holt, John W. Cathcart, D. Kalaokalani Jr., A. E. Cox, Wm. A. Kane, James Quinn, and Ruel Kinney are Republicans, but they will be given the support of those behind the ticket. Thos. Gandall, H. C. Vida, and Jesse Uluhi, who are Democrats, are considered labor men, and as such they were included in the ticket. For Treasurer, Abraham Fernandez has been selected, but should he decline to run, Geo. C. Beckley, who is running independently, will be given support.

Mass Meeting Tonight
At a mass meeting of the Home Rule party this evening at Kakaako, Chas. K. Notley will address the attendants. He will speak on general issues, particularly on the benefit to be derived should the Home Rulers be successful at the polls. W. C. Aehl will be one of the speakers. J. M. Poeppoe and Chas. Broad will also do some speech-making. Notley will leave in the Mauna Kea tomorrow noon for Hawaii, where he will register and return here, preparatory to his going to Kauai.

A very large mass meeting is being arranged for Saturday night to take place on the premises of Charlie Aehl at Palama. This is done in order to get things started at once. Music will be furnished by the Kaili-haulani Glee Club and the Portuguese band, provided the latter's services can be secured. The prominent speakers will be W. C. Aehl, Charles Notley, Abraham Fernandez, Charles Broad, J. M. Poeppoe, D. Kalaokalani Sr., H. C. Vida, Wm. Olepau, S. K. Mahoe, D. M. Kupihea, and several others.
