**Former Honolulan in Coast Politics**  
Herman M. Levy, who made many friends in this city when he was clerk at the Hawaiian Hotel some years ago, is figuring prominently in San Francisco politics according to the following article which appeared in the Examiner of October 28:  
In the Thirty-eighth Assembly district Herman M. Levy, second son of Rabbi M. S. Levy of the Geary street temple, is the Independence League candidate for the lower house of the Legislature. He is hard at work upon his canvass, and friends claim that he will be elected by a large plurality.  
Mr. Levy is a native of this State, having been born in San Jose. He is a graduate of Heald's College, and for some years, prior to a visit to Honolulu, he was employed by one of the leading law firms in this city. He spent seven years in the Orient, and while there he had every opportunity of studying conditions bearing upon America's relations with Asiatic races. He is firm in his stand for exclusion, in accordance with the declaration upon that subject in the Independence party national platform.  
Having lived in the Thirty-eighth district for many years, Mr. Levy has a wide acquaintance among its voters. This acquaintance is helping him wonderfully in his canvass, for from all sections of the district he has received repeated assurances of staunch support.

## LAND ADVISORY BOARD REPORTS

Chairman Lewis And Carl Smith Have Suggestions

Governor Frear's Land Advisory Board, through the chairman, A. Lewis, Jr., presented its report to the Governor yesterday. Three reports were handed in, the main one being signed by Lewis, Kanakani, and J. P. Cooke, and one differing in many things submitted by Carl Smith of Hilo. The third report was a concurring one, being written by A. W. Carter, and only differing in some small details from that of Mr. Lewis. W. A. Kinney did not join in any of the reports on account of the fact that he has been out of the Territory most of the time since the Board was appointed. Mr. Lewis made the following statement yesterday:

"In all, the Commission received sixty-three communications in response to its request for suggestions," said Chairman Lewis. "This includes all communications. The most of these were mere disavowals of desire or qualification to make suggestions. Some were mere complaints of administration in particular instances. Some were petitions addressed to us under a total misapprehension of our functions. Only five or six really contained constructive criticism.

"As to present methods the Commission recommends the retention of the 299-year leasehold as subserving a useful purpose. The cash freehold and right of purchase lease system by requiring large initial payments, tax provisions as to cultivation, and early attainment of patent, have led to many abuses, and while they should be retained should be greatly amended. The Settlement Association plan should be repealed.

"The Commission believes that with the exception of a few amendments the great land law problems of the Territory are ones of administration rather than of much-needed legislation." The Commission recommends a homestead agreement. Lands should be disposed of by lot of drawings, giving all applicants an equal chance. The area should be the amount reasonably required to support a family. The price should not be less than ten per cent. nor more than twenty-five per cent. of the appraised value. The amount of cultivation required should not be less than half the area of the arable land. Titles should not be given before ten years, and at least five years' residence should be required, nothing less than six months at a time to count.

"The Commission recommends an appropriation of at least \$50,000 for a complete survey and classification of the public lands of the Territory and the setting aside of receipts from public lands for the creation of roads. The Commission proposes the establishment of a government commission agency in Honolulu for the purpose of handling island-grown products. The Commission does not wholly agree with Mr. Newell as to cane land being too valuable for homestead purposes, and, while believing that the development of undeveloped lands should be a major purpose in the homestead system, believes that "lands already highly developed, such as land at present under cultivation for sugar cane, should be gradually opened for settlement."
