BIDS OPENED FOR GIANT BATTLESHIP WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 9.—Four shipbuilding companies competed for the contract for the construction of the battleship Utah, bids for which were opened at the Navy Department today. The lowest bidder was the New York Shipbuilding Company of Camden, N. J., at \$3,946,000 for a 20% knot ship. A bid for the construction of a 21-knot vessel was submitted by the For River Company of Quincy, Mass., at \$4,440,000, the lowest bid for this class. The Utah is to be a sister ship of the Florida, now being constructed at the Brooklyn Navy Yard, and is to be of about 21,825 tons displacement. Bids also were opened for supplying machinery for the Florida and for armor for both vessels. For the machinery for the Florida, the Newport News Shipbuilding and Dry Dock Company was the lowest bidder at \$1,517,000.

POLICE AROUSED (Continued from Page 1) and in the darkness they could not be identified. Riedel says that one of them who khaki and the other probably white. Smithies arrived soon after the occurrence. He took the Japanese to his home and dressed his head, where he had been struck. From the nature of the wound, or rather contusion, it would seem that the robbers had employed a sandbag in knocking down the man. The other affair occurred on Liliha street, near Kuukini road, last Wednesday evening at about 9 o'clock. A Japanese, employed by Mr. Stokes at his residence at Puunui, was returning home from town, when he was knocked down by a blow on the head, struck by some person who had approached from behind. His pockets were rifled, but a small sum of money was the only booty obtained. The Japanese thinks that there was only one man in the affair, but the police believe that two were concerned. Both cases are now being handled by Chief of Detectives Kallakela. Another instance of street robbery, though of a somewhat different nature, was reported to the police last Wednesday evening, when a Hawaiian who was sleeping off a jag at the corner of Queen and Ward streets, had \$25 stolen from his pockets. Officer Espinosa went to the scene and arrested one Abe Kahulani. This man appeared in the Police Court this morning on a charge of larceny in the second degree, and was sent to jail for nine months.

TAFT BOARD DEFENSE (Continued from Page 1) than would be required under more favorable conditions. With the appropriation of the \$474,719 recommended by the Chief of Engineers, there will be but a very small balance remaining of the sum originally recommended by the Taft Board. In most of the branches of the work the appropriation will be complete. The fortifying of Honolulu and Pearl Harbor is in line with the policy inaugurated in 1886 when a joint board, composed of officers of the Army and Navy, and of civilians, with Secretary of War Endicott at its head, was appointed to report and recommend a plan for the fortification of the coast of the United States. It was from the estimates made by the Endicott Board that all appropriations were made, until, in 1906, President Roosevelt appointed a new board with Secretary Taft at the head. This new board was not only saddled with the task of providing for the protection of the mainland and Alaska, but also for the insular territory. The Taft Board reported in favor of the expenditure of \$3,254,000 at Honolulu and Pearl Harbor, the only fortification recommended for the Hawaiian Islands. The recommendation for the appropriation of \$600,000 for work on Honolulu Harbor is to provide money

Her cargo consisted of 7000 bags sugar, 1619 bags coffee, 151 bags taro, 11 bags yam, 5 bags beans, 11 bags ginger, 50 bags charcoal, 56 bunches bananas, 84 bunches hides, 2 bundles sheep skin, 1 keg butter, 23 barrels oranges, 24 cases oranges, 15 barrels dried fish, 14 cases dried fish, 14 cases preserves. Purser Friel reports that there are 6160 bags of sugar awaiting shipment at Honouliuli and Punaluu.
