HOLLYDAY'S REPORT FAVORABLE WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 22.—Admiral Hollyday's report has been presented to the Secretary of the Navy. It is a strong plea for the equipping of the insular naval stations with the necessary improvements. His recommendations include the expenditure of one million three hundred thousand dollars at Pearl Harbor.

THINK WAR MAY BE AVERTED ROME, Italy, Nov. 22.—Signor Tittoni, the Italian Minister of Foreign Affairs, was in conference with the Minister of Foreign Affairs for Serbia and the French Ambassador. The result of the conference was reassuring and a statement has been given out that it is believed that war in the Balkans can be averted.

DEMOCRATIC CAMPAIGN FUNDS CHICAGO, Ill., Nov. 22.—The statement of receipts and expenditures of the Democratic National Campaign Committee was given out to the public today. The receipts from all sources amounted to \$629,644, and the expenditures for the campaign were \$619,410.

QUEEN IN SAN FRANCISCO SAN FRANCISCO, Calif., Nov. 22.—Queen Liliuokalani arrived here aboard the S. S. Mongolia today. She was in good health. The Chinese special ambassador, Thang Shao-yi, and his party also arrived safely.

MEMORIAL SERVICES IN JAPAN TOKIO, Japan, Nov. 21.—Services were held today at the Chinese Legation in memory of the Emperor and Empress Dowager in China. Similar services were held at the Chinese Consulates in Korea.

AUSTRIANS AND SERBIANS CLASH VIENNA, Austria, Nov. 22.—There has been a battle on the frontier of Bosnia and Herzegovina between Austrian and Serbian troops, in which three Austrians and seventeen Serbians were killed.

KING OSCAR VISITS AUSTRIA PARIS, France, Nov. 22.—King Oscar of Sweden and Queen Sophia arrived here today from England on their way to Vienna, where they will be the guests of Emperor Franz Josef.
