**FISH MAY COME FROM SOUTH SEAS**

The schooner Concord of the Miller Salvage Company will leave this afternoon for the South Sea Islands, sailing at about 5 o'clock. She has been refitted and is now anchored in the stream, where she is receiving supplies, preparatory to leaving for a long cruise. The Concord will be commanded by Captain E. Piltz.

The crew will be signed some time this afternoon. Eugene DeVauchelle will be engineer of a gasoline launch which is to be taken along. The launch was recently brought from Molokai and had since been given a general overhauling.

Captain Piltz and his men will, during the trip south, engage in deep-sea fishing. If catches prove satisfactory the industry will be kept up to supply the local fish market.

**MANDATES FROM U.S. SUPREME COURT**

A number of mandates in Hawaiian cases that have come before the Supreme Court of the United States have come down from that tribunal, being received here yesterday by the Mongolia mail. The results in most of these cases have previously been announced by cable of mail from Washington, such as the result in the Lanai case, in which the writ of error was dismissed for want of jurisdiction; the Morita Keizo case, in which the judgment of the Supreme Court of the Territory was affirmed, etc.

In the case of the Inter-Island Steam Navigation Company vs. the Tax Assessor, the judgment is against the former, the company being ordered to pay the \$65 judgment appealed from.

The writ of error in the case of the Rapid Transit vs. the Tax Assessor is dismissed for want of jurisdiction. This is in favor of the Assessor.

In another case of the same parties the decree of the Territorial Supreme Court is affirmed and the Assessor is given judgment against the Rapid Transit with his costs.

passed by the Board of Health, which has by its third reading in the lower branch of the Legislature, was given its first reading by title.

**More Visitors**  
A letter from Delegate Kalaniana'ole, suggesting that he be empowered to invite a Congressional delegation to visit Hawaii this year as the guests of the Territory, and recommending that sufficient money be appropriated to bring the visitors, was read and referred to the Judiciary Committee.

Chairman Knudsen of the Judiciary Committee reported favorably on House Resolution No. 4, asking Congress to pass a law requiring that only citizen labor be employed on Government works in this Territory.

**Pay For Fisheries**  
House Resolution No. 5, asking Congress to appropriate money to pay for fisheries in this Territory which are now owned and controlled by private interests, and to take the necessary steps toward the condemnation of the said fisheries, was also reported favorably by the Judiciary Committee.

Senator Coelho objected to the resolution, which he said was drafted by the legal advisor of an alien fishing concern engaged in business in this city. He asked that action on the resolution be deferred until the tenth day of the session. A motion to that effect carried.

The Judiciary Committee reported favorably on House Concurrent Resolution No. 7, relative to the proposal to extend an invitation to a Congressional delegation to visit Hawaii at the expense of the Territory. The report was adopted.

**Fixes Harbor Fees**  
Senator Coelho introduced a bill fixing the fees for pilotage in the harbor of Honolulu as follows:  
"For coming into port and also going out for all mail steamers of one thousand tons register or upwards, having accommodations for at least one cabin passenger to every one hundred tons register \$50.00; for all vessels of war, two dollars per foot on draught of water; for all sailing vessels under two hundred tons register, one dollar and fifty cents per foot; for all other vessels and steamers, five cents per ton. For anchoring vessels outside, twenty dollars; if brought into harbor this charge shall be reduced to ten dollars. For any detention on board a vessel for more than twenty-four hours the compensation shall be ten dollars per day. All receipts for fees and charges for pilotage at the port of Honolulu shall be paid to the Superintendent of Public Works for the use of the Territory of Hawaii."

**Kalama's Bill**  
Kalama introduced his promised bill, providing that any citizen who will reach the age of twenty-one years on or before a general election shall be allowed to vote. The bill passed its first reading and was referred to the Printing Committee.

Coelho introduced a resolution calling for reports from the courts of all probate cases before them. Said he:  
"I know of some cases where probate cases have been in the courts for twenty years. There are people walking the streets of Honolulu without means, simply because executors have not turned over estates. I believe that we should have this matter looked into at once."

The resolution was referred to the Judiciary Committee.

The pay of the chaplain was the subject of some discussion, when the

salary list for the Senate employees came up.

**No Increase for Chaplain**  
Senator Coelho, who introduced the resolution fixing the salaries, believed that the Senate should raise the pay of its spiritual guardian and allow him \$200 for his services, instead of \$150, as at the previous session of the Legislature. This plan did not meet with general favor, however, and the resolution, as finally passed, left the Rev. Kalino with but \$150 in return for sixty 3-minute invocations, or something less than \$1 a minute for the actual time that he is employed.

The salary list as finally amended and passed is as follows:  
Clerk, \$12 a day; Assistant Clerk, \$8 a day; Sergeant-at-Arms, \$5 a day; Messenger, \$3 a day; Chaplain, \$150 for the session.

Senator Coelho then introduced his resolution, asking the Governor to call for the resignation of Attorney General Hemenway. The resolution was referred to the Judiciary Committee.

Senator Quinn introduced a bill making some changes in the criminal laws of the Territory. It passed first reading and was referred to the Printing Committee.

Baker introduced a bill amending the law relative to the serving of processes in legal actions against corporations. The bill passed its first reading and was referred to the Printing Committee.

**Only \$24,000 Wanted**

Twenty-four thousand dollars was the sum asked by Baker for the construction of a road to the Volcano House on the island of Hawaii. He asked that his resolution be laid on the table to be considered with the appropriation bill. Such was the action taken.

House Bill No. 1, appropriating \$29,000 to defray the expenses of the Legislature, passed its third reading.

Senate Bill No. 21, introduced by Coelho, amending the laws governing the income tax, and regulating the percentage of the tax on a graded scale from 1 per cent to 4 per cent, passed its second reading and was referred to the Committee on Taxation.

**Inheritance Tax**

Senate Bill No. 22, amending the inheritance tax law, and fixing the rate of the inheritance tax on a graduated scale from 1 per cent to 25 per cent, passed its second reading and was referred to the Committee on Taxation.

Senator Moore's bill (Senate Bill No. 29), amending certain sections of the liquor law, passed the second reading and was referred to the Ways and Means Committee.

**Knudsen's Bill**  
Senate Bill No. 36, amending the divorce laws of the Territory with regard to the procedure in divorce cases, passed its second reading and was referred to the Judiciary Committee.

Senate Bill No. 35, amending the laws governing the sessions of the Circuit Courts, passed its second reading and was referred to the Judiciary Committee.

Senate Bill No. 40, amending the laws governing the hunting with firearms, so as to allow the killing off of wild goats by unlicensed hunters, passed its second reading and was referred to the Public Lands Committee.

A communication from the House, stating that Senate Bill No. 1, appropriating money to cover the expenses of the legislative session, had passed its third reading, was read.

The Senate adjourned until 2 o'clock this afternoon.

**SAN FRANCISCO BAY ENTRANCE**  
Notice is hereby given that San Francisco Light-Vessel No. 79 will be replaced by Relief Light-Vessel No. 79 about March 1, 1909. The change will be temporary. The Relief light-vessel will show lights and sound signals having the same characteristics as those of Light-Vessel No. 79, now on the station, excepting that each of the two lights will be fixed white without eclipses, shown from three lens lanterns, encircling the westheads at a height of 46 feet above the water and visible 12 miles in clear weather.

Relief Light-Vessel No. 79 is a flush-deck steam vessel, has two masts, schooner-rigged, no bowsprit, a black smokestack, and a steam whistle between the masts, but differs from Light-Vessel No. 79 in having all visible parts from the bow to the middle of the foremast, and from the middle of the mainmast aft, painted red; all visible parts between the fore and main masts, including the middle third of each lantern mast, white. The daymarks on the mastheads have five vertical stripes, three red and two white, and on the springstay, midway between the two masts, there is an oval daymark with one white and two red vertical stripes. The number "76" is in white on each bow and each quarter, and in black on each side of the springstay daymark. The word "Relief" is painted in large black letters on the middle of each side.
