

TAFT BECAME MASON AT SIGHT. President-Elect Accorded Honor By Fraternity of Ohio. Cincinnati, O., Feb. 18.—President-elect Taft is a Master Mason. The impressive ceremony which brought him that distinction today was conducted by Charles S. Hokinson, Ohio Grand Master. The highest Masonic authority of seventeen States witnessed Taft's admission into the order, as did also the members of Kitwinning Lodge, of which the father of the President-elect was a member and in which Charles P. Taft was inducted under the auspices of his father. Scotch Rite Cathedral was the scene of the ceremonies. The procedure, which culminated in the declaration that Taft was a Mason, occupied thirty-five minutes.
