WEEKLY WEATHER BULLETIN

A very severe rain and wind storm obtained over the islands on the 11th and 12th, and excessively heavy rains—5.24 to 14.34 inches in 24 consecutive hours—were reported from the Puna, Hilo and Hamakua districts of Hawaii; the Koolau and Hamakualoa districts of Maui—4.08 to 5.27 inches; the Koolau and Ewa districts of Oahu, and the Kona and Waimea districts of Kauai—2.54 to 3.59 inches.

The rains in the Kau and Puna districts of Hawaii were insufficient to break the drought. No reports were received from the drought districts of Maui.

Much damage was caused by this storm by the washing out of roads, bridges, and culverts, and in other ways.

The greatest amounts of rainfall, in inches, were reported from the Hilo district of Hawaii and varied from 10.73 to 17.62 (no reports were received from the central portion of the district). The amounts of rainfall in the remaining districts were: Hawaii—Kohala 2.17 to 2.73, Hamakua 5.61 to 6.75, Puna 7.32 to 10.80, Kau 0.09 to 0.86, and Kona 0.19 to 0.29; Maui—Hamakualoa and Koolau 5.27 to 5.58, Hana 0.87, and Wailuku 2.34 to 3.73; Oahu—Koolauloa 2.95, Koolau 3.41 to 7.42, Honolulu 1.20, Ewa 1.44 to 4.38, and Waianae 0.46; Kauai—Kona and Koolau 4.00 to 5.29, and Puna and Waimea 1.83 to 3.87; and Molokai 2.33 to 2.90.

The rainfall was above the average of ten or more years at all stations in the Kohala, Hamakua, Hilo and Puna and the northern portion of the Kau district of Hawaii; and the Hamakualoa and Wailuku districts of Maui; at all on Kauai, and Oahu, excepting in the Waianae district.

The departures from the average in the several districts were: Hawaii—Kohala +0.69 to +2.11, Hamakua +3.25 to +4.20, Hilo +7.25 to +13.79, Puna +8.32, Kau +1.15 to -0.80, and Kona -0.74; Maui +3.17 to +3.49; Oahu—Koolauloko and Koolauloa +1.41 to +1.99, and Honolulu and Ewa -0.62 to -0.82; and Kauai +2.33 to +3.12.

There was more rain than during the preceding week in all districts, excepting the Kona of Hawaii, and the eastern portion of the Waimea of Kauai. The greatest excesses varied from 4.25 to 12.53 inches, and occurred in the Hilo and Puna districts of Hawaii. The only other station reporting an excess of more than 4.00 inches was in the Koolauloko district of Oahu. The greatest deficiency as compared with last week was 0.45 inch.

Higher mean temperatures than those of the preceding week generally were reported.

The following table shows the weekly averages of temperature and rainfall for the principal islands and for the Group:

At the local office of the U. S. Weather Bureau in Honolulu the weather was cloudy on the last three days. Showers occurred on four dates and a heavy rain on the 12th, totaling 1.20 inches, 0.62 inch above the normal, and 0.61 more than during the preceding week. The maximum temperature was 77°, minimum 60°, and mean 68.8°, 2.5° above the normal, and 0.2° lower than last week's. Southwesterly winds prevailed on the 9th, easterly on the 13th, and northeasterly on the remaining dates, with an average hourly velocity of 10.9 miles. The mean daily relative humidity ranged from 72% to 93%—unusually high. The mean daily barometer was above the normal on three dates, and below on the remaining, and the mean for the week, 29.98 inches, was 0.03 inch below normal.

ISLAND OF HAWAII.

Puakea Ranch (11)—Rain fell on four dates and amounted to 2.61 inches, .37 inch more than during the preceding week.—A. Mason.

Kohala Mill (11)—The mean temperature was 68.0°. Showers occurred on five dates and totaled 2.17 inches, .69 inch above the average, and .02 inch more than the previous week's.—T. H. Lillie.

Kohala Mission (12)—Rain fell on five dates and amounted to 3.72 inches, 2.11 above the average, and 1.52 more than last week's. The mean temperature was 68.0°.—Dr. B. D. Bond.

Niuli (11)—The mean temperature was 69.0°. There were five days with rainfall, which totaled 2.93 inches, 1.75 above the average, and .65 inch more than the previous week's.—F. C. Paetow.

Kukuihae (11)—Excessively heavy rains occurred on the last two dates and amounted to 6.75 inches, 4.24 more than during the preceding week. The mean temperature was 70.9°.—H. T. Barclay.

Honokaa (10)—The mean temperature was 68.5°. Rain fell on four dates—excessively heavy on the 10th—and amounted to 5.61 inches, 3.25 above the average, and 1.24 more than last week's.—P. V. Knudsen.

Paaui (11)—Showers occurred on four dates—excessively heavy on the 11th—and totaled 6.47 inches, 4.20 above the average, and 3.37 more than the previous week's. The mean temperature was 69.6°.—L. Wilson.

Ookala (11)—The mean temperature was 69.7°. Rain fell on six dates and amounted to 17.62 inches—14.16 on the 11th—7.73 above the average, and 11.56 more than last week's.—W. G. Walker.

Laupahoehoe (11)—There were six days with rainfall, totaling 17.23 inches—of which 14.32 occurred on the 11th—12.18 above the average, and 12.53 more than during the preceding week.—E. W. Barnard.

Papaikou (11)—Rains occurred daily and were excessively heavy on the 6th and 11th, and for the week totaled 16.95 inches, 13.79 above the average, and 12.75 more than the previous week's.—J. T. Moir.

Hilo (11)—The mean temperature was 68.0°. Rain fell on six dates—excessively heavy on the 6th and 11th—totaling 10.73 inches, 7.25 above the average, and 7.20 more than last week's.—L. C. Lyman.

Ponahawai (11)—Rains occurred on six dates—excessively heavy on the 11th—amounting to 12.56 inches, 6.82 more than during the preceding week. The mean temperature was 67.0°.—J. E. Gamble.

Kapoho (11)—The mean temperature was 68.4°. Rain fell on six dates—excessively heavy on the 6th and 11th—and totaled 10.80 inches, 8.32 above the average, and 9.26 more than last week's.—H. J. Lyman.

Kaueleau (10)—Rains occurred on the first four dates—excessive in amount on the 6th—and totaled 7.32 inches, 4.24 more than the preceding week's. The mean temperature was 64.8°.—L. F. Turner.

Pahala (10)—The mean temperature was 67.9°. Showers occurred on the 5th and amounted to .99 inch, that amount more than last week's, and 1.15 inches below the average.—Haw. Agric. Co.

Naalehu (10)—Showers occurred on the 5th and amounted to .63 inch, .60 less than the average for the week.—C. H. White.

Kau (10)—The mean temperature was 63.2°. Rains occurred on two dates and amounted to .86 inch, .78 more than during the preceding week.—W. H. Hayden.

Kealahou (11)—Showers occurred on four dates and totaled .29 inch, .08 less than during the preceding week.—R. Wallace.

Kealahou (10)—The mean temperature was 69.8°. Rain fell on the first two dates and amounted to .19 inch, .74 below the average, and .32 less than last week's.—Rev. S. H. Davis.

ISLAND OF MAUI.

Huelo (11)—The mean temperature was 65.6°. Rain fell on five dates—excessively heavy on the 11th—and amounted to 6.58 inches, 3.47 more than the preceding week's.—J. L. Ferreira.

Haiku (11)—Cloudy weather obtained, with daily rainfall amounting to 5.27 inches—excessively heavy on the 11th—3.17 above the average, and 1.72 more than last week's. The mean temperature was 68.5°.—D. D. Baldwin.

Hana (9)—The mean temperature was 69.2°. Showers occurred on three dates and totaled .37 inch, .13 more than during the preceding week.—G. O. Cooper.

Kahului (12)—Heavy rains fell on the last three days and amounted to 3.73 inches, that amount more than last week's, and 3.49 above the average. The mean temperature was 73.3°.—J. A. Hattie.

Wailuku (11)—The mean temperature was 70.0°. Showers occurred on the 10th and a heavy rain on the 11th, totaling 2.34 inches, 2.02 more than the preceding week's.—Bro. Frank.

ISLAND OF OAHU.

Kahuku (12)—The mean temperature was 67.2°. Showers occurred on five dates and heavy rain on the 12th, totaling 2.95 inches, 1.99 above the average, and 2.34 more than last week's.—W. I. Vorfeld.

Maula (12)—Showers occurred on three dates and excessively heavy rains—6.75 inches—on the 12th, totaling 7.42 inches, 4.61 more than the previous week's. The mean temperature was 72.5°.—Mrs. E. W. Hay.

Mauawili Ranch (12)—The mean temperature was 68.0°. Showers occurred on five dates and a heavy rainfall on the 12th, amounting to 2.41 inches, 1.41 above the average, and 2.02 more than last week's.—J. Hord.

Waialua (13)—The mean temperature was 65.8°, and the rainfall 2.24 inches, 1.65 more than during the preceding week. At the ditch there was 4.38 inches of rainfall, 1.61 more than last week's.—A. Lister.

Ewa (13)—Showers occurred on two dates and a light continuous rain on the 12th, totaling 1.44 inches, 1.15 more than last week's, and .82 inch above the average. The mean temperature was 69.8°.—R. Muller.

Waianae (12)—Showers occurred on three dates and amounted to .46 inch, .05 less than the average, and .44 more than the preceding week's. The mean temperature was 71.4°.—F. Meyer.

ISLAND OF KAUAI.

Kilauea (12)—Showers occurred on four dates and rains on the last two, totaling 5.29 inches, 3.12 above the average and 3.20 more than last week's. The mean temperature was 66.0°.—L. B. Boretko.

Keala (12)—Showers occurred on five dates and a heavy rain on the 12th, amounting to 2.40 inches, 1.27 more than during the preceding week.—Makee Sugar Co.

Koloa (12)—The mean temperature was 68.0°. Showers occurred on three dates followed by continuous rains on the 11th and 12th—excessively heavy on the 12th—totaling 4.90 inches, 2.33 above the average, and .10 inch more than last week's.—The Koloa Sugar Co.

Eleele (12)—Cool weather obtained, with showers amounting to 1.83 inches, .45 inch less than during the preceding week.—McBryde Sugar Co.

Makaweli (12)—The mean temperature was 70.0°. Showers occurred on two dates and excessively heavy rains on the 12th—3.59 inches—totaling 3.87, 2.76 above the average, and 2.23 more than last week's.—Haw. Sugar Co.

ISLAND OF MOLOKAI.

Mapulehu Ranch (12)—The mean temperature was 69.6°. Showers occurred on three dates and heavy rains on the last two, amounting to 2.90 inches.—C. C. Conrad.

Molokai Ranch (12)—Showers occurred on three and heavy rains on the last two dates, totaling 2.33 inches, 1.20 more than last week's.—G. P. Cooke.
