LOAN BILL DEAD IN THE SENATE

SENATE
59th Day—Morning Session
There will be no loan bill for improvements during the next biennial period. The bill came up from the House this morning, and the Senate proceeded to land on it with a unanimity of action that killed it past all hope of resurrection.
The bill (House Bill No. 27) embodied most of the items which the Conference Committee struck out of the Appropriation Bill, including the \$75,000 for repairs to the Judiciary building. There was also an item of \$15,000 for the Kapiolani Home as well as several wharves for which no provision was made in the Appropriation Bill as finally adopted.
After the reading of the bill, Coelho moved that an item be inserted for an armory and court house at Lahaina. The Maui Senator did not stipulate any particular amount for the buildings, evidently being willing to take whatever might be allowed.
Before the amendment had been placed before the Senate, McCarthy moved that action on the bill be postponed indefinitely.
The motion prevailed, there being a forest of waving arms when the votes in favor of postponement were called for.
Buried Also
Makekau then moved that the vote be reconsidered. Kalama made a talk against taking any action that would shut out all chance of a change of front should the loan bill be found to be necessary. The vote against reconsideration was overwhelming, however, and the loan bill was not only sent to the bonafire, but was interred so deeply that nothing will be able to bring it up again this session.

Senate Bill No. 154, the Waikiki reclamation bill, was laid on the table. This bill, which was introduced late in the session, was ordered printed, that its text might not be lost, there being a tacit understanding that it would not be acted upon this session.
Baker Afraid of Bill
When House Bill No. 219, forbidding the sale of live stock afflicted with the glanders or farcy, and requiring that, should any man sell stock in which disease develops within two weeks after sale, he must refund the purchase money, passed third reading, much against the wish of Senator Baker. Baker, Brown, Harvey, and Makekau voted against it.
The thing that bothered Baker the most was the provision requiring that

J. P. Cooke Has Narrow Escape

Some excitement was caused about 10 o'clock this morning by a runaway which occurred on a runabout street. A two-horse surrey in which J. P. Cooke was riding suddenly started down the street full speed, the near horse having taken fright through the lines becoming tangled around his tail. The driver made an effort to hold the team but the rig was thrown against the sidewalk and capsized.
Mr. Cooke jumped out of the surrey and escaped unhurt. The driver, who was thrown out, hung on to the lines and was dragged for about fifty feet. Just opposite the Schuman carriage, Marshall, of the express company, very pluckily rushed out and grabbed the horses by the heads, bringing them to a standstill.

NEWS MEN BOUND TO LONDON

Newspaper Writers and Proprietors Of Australia and New Zealand Are On Board Marama--Going To Conference of Empire--Mr. Brett Remembers Honolulu and Bulletin--Will See the City
Making a party of nineteen, including the ladies of the delegation of Australian and New Zealand newspapermen going through to the Conference of the Empire, arrived this noon on board the Australian liner Marama. The visitors were met by C. J. Cooper of the Promotion Committee and later by a delegation of local newspapermen on the wharf. Arrangements have been made for the party to make a tour of the city in automobiles, taking in the Park, the aquarium and all the principal points of interest.
Mr. Brett of the Auckland Star remembers Honolulu and the Bulletin as he was the man who gave the Bulletin in connection with the disaster to the American squadron in the typhoon at Apia, Samoa. Brett was on board the Alameda when she arrived at Apia. On the way up from that port he spent his time interviewing the survivors and on arrival here enabled the Bulletin to publish the first news of the disaster appearing in any paper of the world.

Big Contract Goes To Honolulu Firm

The contract for a second big plant of sugar machinery for Formosa has been awarded to the Honolulu Iron Works. Through the size of the new contract has been kept more or less of a secret, it is understood that the job is even larger than that undertaken by the same firm for another Formosa concern some time ago.
The remarkable success of the Honolulu plant now in operation in Formosa, was responsible for the letting of the second contract in this city.
As the Honolulu Iron Works is at present rushed with business, Manager C. Hedemann left this morning on the Tenyo Maru for New York City, where the new plant will be built. Hedemann will remain there until the work is completed, supervising the job just as carefully as though it were carried out in the Honolulu factory.

CATHCART CALLS ON HEMENWAY

County Attorney Cathcart this morning addressed a letter to Attorney General Hemenway, asking that he take charge of the prosecution of the case before the Grand Jury where in Cathcart is charged by Goo Wan Hoy with battery. The letter follows:
"Honolulu, T. H.,
"April 27, 1909.
"Honorable C. R. Hemenway, Attorney General.
"Sir:—Tomorrow morning there will come before the Grand Jury for investigation the case of The Territory against myself wherein I am charged with having committed an assault and battery on a Chinaman named Goo Wan Hoy.
"The witnesses against me have been duly subpoenaed according to a list furnished by Goo Wan Hoy to be before the Grand Jury at 10 o'clock a. m.
"I would respectfully request that either in person or by Deputy you present this matter to the Grand Jury.

ABDUL HAMID IS DEAD?

CONSTANTINOPLE, Turkey, April 27.—Abdul Hamid, Sultan of the Ottoman Empire, has been dethroned. The National Assembly acted unanimously and has issued a formal decree proclaiming Sheikh Usilam Mohammed Reschid Effendi, a brother of Abdul Hamid, as Sultan of Turkey.
Ahmed Pasha is forming a Cabinet.
There are conflicting reports of the fate of Abdul Hamid.
One report has it that he is held as a prisoner; another that he is dead and his palace has been burned.

ADANA, Turkey, April 27.—There has been a renewal of the murders and incendiarism. The situation in the entire district is critical.

Murderess Pleads Guilty.—New York, April 14.—Sarah Koton, the young Russian woman charged with shooting and killing Dr. Martin W. Auspitz, August 7 last, pleaded guilty to manslaughter in the first degree when called to trial for her life in the supreme court here today. She was rescheduled for sentence on Friday.
