WHAT MOTT-SMITH EXPECTS OF MEN

Impresses Upon Inspectors Necessity of Obedience

President Mott-Smith of the Board of Health lined the inspectors up this morning and had a heart-to-heart talk with them. He impressed upon them the necessity of loyalty, ability and obedience in their work if the best results are to be achieved, and informed them that he would take them one at a time and have a talk with each one separately to find out what has been and is being done. The new president does not intend to make any radical changes immediately, but will begin by trying to adjust things in the office so they will run smoothly. He is given a somewhat freer hand than many of his predecessors through the act of the Legislature appropriating a lump sum for the running expenses of the department. "I feel quite at home over there," said Mr. Mott-Smith this morning. "You see, I drafted a good many of the laws relating to the Board of Health, and in 1906 I drew up the rules and regulations governing the department. I am now going over (Continued on Page 4)

PAY DISPUTE IS FINALLY SETTLED

Mayor Countersigns Demands For First Fifteen Days in March and Money Will Soon Be Forthcoming

At noon on Friday salary and pay warrants for the first half of the month of March will be distributed by Auditor Bicknell. At 11 o'clock this morning Mayor Fern affixed his name to the demands, as agreed upon in the joint conference between himself and the Road Committee of the Board of Supervisors, and the demands went across to the Auditor's office. The demands total \$1,832.42, of which \$1,008.22 is for pay and the remainder for salaries. Salaries are limited to officials and office attaches. Laborers come in on the pay basis. With the issuing of the warrants authorized by the signing of the demands the unfortunate state of affairs, growing out of the dispute between the Mayor and the Board of Supervisors, will be settled. The Enabling Act settled everything up to, and including, the last of February, but left the first fifteen days of March for the county government to straighten out as best it could. It took a good many conferences to arrive at an agreement, as the warring factions fought it out to the end. Finally a basis of "compromise" was discovered, however. As it was, the Road Committee and the Mayor were in session much of this forenoon, and for a time it looked as though there would be a deadlock after all. His Honor has one benchmark on the committee, Supervisor McClellan, and the majority of the committee, Supervisors Quinn and Kane, found themselves pitted against a strong opposition. Quinn knew what he wanted, however, and held out till the end for what he considered a square deal for his men. When the demands, bearing the executive signature, with the ink yet damp, came in to the Auditor from the Mayor's office, each was found to be countersigned with the names of Supervisors Quinn, Kane and McClellan, the Committee on Roads and Bridges. Under the terms agreed upon for the division of the money available to pay for road work during the first fifteen days in March, Road Supervisor Wilson, the Mayor's appointee, receives remuneration for ten days. Cummins, the Board man, will have to be satisfied with five days' pay. The other appointees are treated on the same basis.

WATER SYSTEM FOR THE MID-PACIFIC

Contracts have been let by the Mid-Pacific Institute for a pumping plant, pipe system and storage tanks for the institute premises. The outfit is to utilize the three wells lately developed on the grounds of the institution, and when the plant has been installed the Mid-Pacific will be absolutely independent, as far as water is concerned. Three very fine wells were located on the institute property, the water being of excellent quality. The wells are of sufficient size to guarantee a sufficient supply of pure water, not only for household use, but for drinking purposes as well. Two of the tanks, each with a capacity of 10,000 gallons, will be located in back of the schools, on a level with the roof. These tanks will supply the school buildings and will also provide the water necessary to keep the grounds in fine shape. The third tank, of 3,000 gallons capacity, will supply the dairy with water. The pumping plant will be unique, as far as these islands are concerned. It will consist of a gasoline motor directly connected with a gasoline engine pumping plant, said to be the most efficient type of plant in existence. More than 3,000 feet of pipe will be laid in connection with the job. The contract for the work has been let to George H. Paris.



CONVENT OF THE SISTERS OF THE SACRED HEART IN 1859.


The Entertainment Hall of the Convent of the Sacred Heart on Fort street was attractively decorated in honor of the anniversary.

Dying, Man Diagnosed Intoxicated

About 11 o'clock last night a man named James McGinnam was found at the corner of Hotel and Bethel streets, in an unconscious condition. The police officer who discovered the man ran up the Police Station, and the patrol wagon was sent to take the patient to the hospital.

The police state that on arrival at the institution the authorities there refused to admit McGinnam, saying that he was drunk, and not ill. The man was therefore taken to the police station and confined in a cell. At 4 o'clock this morning McGinnam was visited by one of the officers and was found to be dead.

Sheriff Jarrett and his Deputy, Charles Rose, are investigating the matter and an inquest is to be held this evening. The man is said to have shown signs of injury to the head last night.
