BOARD PASSES UP NEW APPOINTMENTS

"What is the use of conferring any appointments tonight," said Supervisor Aylett, "we will have a market in-pector and others to appoint, and let's do it all up together."

So Dr. Bruce McV. Mackall was not confirmed as City and County Physician at last night's meeting of the Board. Neither was M. H. Sanders confirmed as milk and dairy inspector. The members had reasons of their own of course, but there was an unusual silence in passing over the matter. Just one outburst and that from Mr. Aylett. The members, however, quietly voted to postpone the confirmation ceremonies for the present.
The ordinance creating a bureau of supplies for the City and County government was passed. McClellan, Cox and Kane voted against it. Supervisor Logan, author of the ordinance, said he felt certain the measure would prove very beneficial to the city and county officials in the establishment of systematic methods in the buying and handling of supplies, and that it would result economically in the end.
Mayor Fern brought up the subject of electric lights—a very delicate one with some of the members. He said that a number of petitions had been carefully prepared and sent to the Board. That it had been referred to the Committee on Lights, and there apparently it became pau. At least the petitioners complained that they got no results. Mr. Kane took exception to the feeling on the part of the people wanting lights, for he is chairman of that committee.
"I want to say as chairman of the Light Committee, that we have always acted promptly on all petitions for electric lights. There are some forty before this board now, and a number we have allowed. But owing to lack of funds we have had to turn others down. If we have any funds for lights, I am in favor of taking them up in their regular order from the first, not the new ones that come in."
Supervisor Quinn differed with Mr. Kane. He was of the opinion when people want to the trouble of petitioning for lights that they meant business and at least the Board should give them a reply as soon as possible. He suggested estimates be placed on the cost of furnishing lights asked for in each petition, so the Board might figure what funds they had on hand.
Mr. Quinn referred to the recent accident at the waterfront, and asked Superintendent Frazer, who was present, what caused the dark condition of the wharves. He explained by saying that the Pilots Association had requested the shading of lamps toward the sea, to facilitate the docking of vessels in port. He then ventured to explain the matter, and Supervisor Quinn cut him short.
"We haven't asked your opinion, Mr. Frazer, and you are building in. We haven't time for details."
The Board, it is understood, passed a resolution introduced by Mr. Logan, ex-ecuting the good will of the members towards the Mayor's retiring Secretary, Charles L. Rhodes, who, with his wife, dined on the Alameda today for the main time.
"Resolved, That the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of Honolulu, Territory of Hawaii, tenders to Mr. Charles L. Rhodes, on his retirement from the office of Secretary to the Mayor, its appreciation of the ability he has displayed in the onerous position and its best wishes for his health and prosperity wherever his future lot may be cast."

Attorney Peters, the defendant's counsel, only smiled placidly, then moved that the action be dismissed for lack of sufficient evidence. The motion got turned down, and the matter proceeded.
When the dog was exhibited in charge of Detective Lake, the expert dog interpreter, according to his friends, many expressions of sympathy were heard regarding the animal. Minus one eye, ears full of shot, and hide well peppered with lead, he presented a sorry appearance. The jury at last got all the evidence and are reviewing it. It is thought that while the case may cost the County \$200, Yang Chong will get satisfaction, if not damages.

SPECIAL REPORT
