Barry Is Challenged As Juror

The examination of jurors in the case of the Territory against Makino and the other strike leaders, on the charge of conspiracy to prevent the operation of certain plantations, has been a subject of more than ordinary interest for the reason that the strike leaders' attorney is making every effort to exclude from the jury any man who has the slightest connection or sympathy for a plantation.

The attitude of the defense indicates plainly that Makino and his associates are going to set up charges of a deep plot on the part of the prosecution to deprive them of their constitutional rights, and if possible to make it appear that they are not the conspirators, but the other side. It is also expected from the steps already taken by Joseph Lightfoot, Makino's lawyer, that every obstacle in the way of demurrers, exceptions and motions will be interspersed to prolong the trial. Eleven jurors had been temporarily passed yesterday, and one case was continued until today.

When Sergeant E. S. Barry, clerk to Adjutant General Jones, was called, Attorney Lightfoot accused him of wanting to get on the jury in order to convict the Japanese.

"That is not true," protested Barry indignantly, glaring at the attorney.

"It is said that in a conversation with Mr. Chilton you stated that you would like to get on this jury to soak the Japs," replied Lightfoot.

Again Barry denied the charge, and the Agitators' attorney asked permission to produce Chilton, to verify the statement. As Chilton was not in the courtroom, the matter of passing on Mr. Barry was carried over until later.

At the beginning of the examination Attorney Kinney, leading counsel for the prosecution, said:

"We desire an absolutely impartial and fair jury, but we also desire a speedy trial. If these defendants are innocent they should be promptly vindicated, if guilty as promptly punished."

Mr. Kinney, in his examination of the jurors called, asked brief pointed questions, as to whether they were in any way connected with plantations, whether their relatives were employed on plantations, whether they owned sugar stock, what business transactions they had with plantations, and whether anything they had heard discussed or said about the strike would influence them.

Attorney Lightfoot went into extended reiteration of questions, much to the disgust of the prosecution. Again and again he would ask a juror if he had any prejudice against the Japanese as a race, whether he could consider the testimony of a Japanese the same as a white man what connection he had with plantations, plantation managers, plantation employes, whether if any such connection would prejudice his mind, and what influence newspaper articles had upon his mind.

Objections were occasionally handed back and forth between contending counsel, but Judge De Bolt stated that he intended to allow considerable latitude to both sides, in order to secure an absolutely fair and impartial jury.

As to the matter of jurors' connections with the different plantations, one example was passed on in the case of Juror Starbird, whose sister is a holder of Oahu stock. When this statement was made in court yesterday, the Judge took the matter under consideration and finally decided it would be better to excuse Mr. Starbird, so that there could be no question of impartiality.

To a spectator there is every reason to believe that Makino and his associates will have a clean, fair and impartial trial before Judge De Bolt and the jury which is being selected with every precaution.


