**THREE BRITISH SHIPS TO COME THIS WAY**

SAN FRANCISCO, June 25.—An announcement was made tonight by Prof. T. M. See, astronomer in charge of the naval observatory at Mare Island, that he has mathematically proved a discovery that the moon is a planet captured by the earth from space and not a detached portion of our globe. He rejects entirely the long-accepted theories of Laplace and Sir George Darwin, ascribing earthly origin of the moon, and asserts that his discovery is supported by rigorous mathematical proof based on the methods of Hill, Poincare and Darwin.

Prof. See's announcement was made in a paper presented to the meeting of the Astronomical Society of the Pacific Coast, and is a further development of his discovery promulgated last January, that all planets and satellites are captured Lodges, which have since had their orbits reduced in size and rounded up under the secular action of the nebular resisting medium once pervading the solar system.

**CHOLERA SPREADS IN ST. PETERSBURG.**

ST. PETERSBURG, June 25.—Ninety-nine new cases of cholera are reported. Today there were thirty-four deaths from the disease.
